Reviews Board Activities During The Past 12 Months

Following are excerpts from the annual report submitted by President F. W. Curtis at the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade annual meeting here yesterday:

"The past twelve months have witnessed a change in the traditional pattern of events for the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, of which not the least has been the opening of a joint central office in the City of Moncton with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and occupied by a permanent secretariat serving both bodies.

On January 28th, 1952, this office was officially declared open at a ceremony in which Mr. René Perrault, President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Donald Morrell, General Manager of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Alfred Parkes, Executive Secretary of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, and your President all took part.

"This was the culmination of many years of effort on the part of previous Maritime Boards and particularly of the 1951 Board, headed by Mr. Johnston Chew, to whom much credit must be paid for the outstanding part he played in finalizing this achievement. This office has now been open some nine months, and while it is perhaps a trifle early to venture a definite opinion on its worth, I cannot help but feel, particularly after having been so closely associated with it, that it is a valuable asset in the future business and economic life of the four Maritime Provinces.

"However, it will take some time for its real value to be felt and appreciated by all, and I can only ask for the indulgence of all Boards for a further period, and until such time as definite policies have been formulated, and our programming has had an opportunity to take a realistic and practical shape.

Legislative Committee

"During the past twelve month period your officers and directors have met on six occasions to discuss matters of mutual concern and interest. We also met jointly with the Maritime Regional Committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Moncton in January of this year, and it was a meeting at which discussions and opinions took place that have since proved to be of real value to both. One of the most important committees to be formed, and to take partial action, has been the Legislative Committee, which drafted a brief to the four Provincial Governments asking for their combined assistance in the development of the natural resources of these four provinces, and recommending that some tangible effort be made to combine the facilities of each province for the benefit of any one of the others.

"Your committee met on April 22nd of this year with the Premier of New Brunswick and his Executive Council in Fredericton, N. B., at which time Mr. G. G. Anglin, Mr. Walter Vail and you, President presented the brief to this government. The Government of Prince Edward Island has also become acquainted with certain aspects of the brief, although no official deputation has awaited upon them yet.

"Unfortunately, we were unable to arrange a meeting with the government of Nova Scotia, but it is hoped that in the near future this will be done. Upon the advice of our Newfoundland representatives, it was thought wise to delay any presentation to the Newfoundland government until certain phases of their economic development had become clearer. An effort was also made by your Executive to form a speaker's panel, as it was felt that in many cases, particularly with smaller Boards and Chambers, a definite need is present for capable and proper speakers to address meetings.

Progress Reported

"Some progress has been made in this respect, and a number of well known men have generously indicated that they would be willing to assist at any time in this project. I believe that our Executive Secretary will make further reference to this matter in his report. A Traffic Safety Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. Watson James, of Saint John, N. B., functioned very successfully during the spring of 1952, and they are to

be commended for the effort put into this important matter. Mr. James is to present a report at this meeting acquainting us with the detailed aspects of the work of this Committee in the past, and advising what it is planning for the future.

"The Maritime Provinces Board of Trade has increased its membership during the past year, but much field work remains to be done if we are to be truly representative of every part of the Atlantic Provinces. At the present time, some 51 Boards and Chambers, representing approximately 4,100 members are paid up members of our organization. Our financial position has also improved materially, as will be indicated in the Financial Report to be presented to you later. To all these Boards and Chambers who have subscribed to our cause, we are deeply grateful and we trust that our actions will merit the continuance of your support.

"Your President had the privilege of visiting the Province of Newfoundland in June of this year, in the company of representative of every Province in Canada, all of whom were active members of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce National Executive. It was a thrilling experience to travel with this distinguished group of businessmen, and to have the opportunity of studying the aggressive economic policies being developed in our sister province. The hospitality displayed by the good people of Newfoundland far exceeded even the good words expressed beforehand about this traditional feature of the Province."

homers and his "almost" fourth in the Sunday game. Then there is Reynolds' ever-ready arm.

On the Brooklyn side, Snider was a standout with four home runs equalling the series' records set by Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig. Reese had a brilliant series at bat and afield, and Black was tremendous in his first two starts, winning the opener 4-2 and losing 2-0 to Reynolds in the fourth game.

The National League hasn't won a series since 1946 when St. Louis Cards whipped Boston Red Sox in seven games. The count now stands 32 to 17 in favor of the American.

The umpires were in hot water throughout the series but nobody was tossed out until the eighth inning of the last game. Then plate umpire Larry Goetz thumbed pitcher Ralph Branca, who had done little since he threw the home-run ball to the Giants' Bobby Thomson when the Dodgers blew the pennant last year.
