MONDAY

Three Prince Edward Island Queen's Scouts have applied for a position on the Canadian Scout contingent to the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Robert Hutchison of Trinity Scout Troop, Charlottetown, William Jones of St. Paul's Scout Troop, Charlottetown and Francis Smith of the St. Eleanor's Troop are the applicants.

Each of these Scouts hold the coveted Queen's Scout badge. Each is a Troop Leader in his own troop and each is an experienced camper and Junior Leader.

GLACE BAY, Jan. 4 (Special)—The Charlottetown Islanders, displayed a smoother passing, better organized attack, to snuff the celebratory Glace Bay Miners 5-1 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night.

Centreman Roy "Buck" Whitlock led the Islanders to their fourth straight victory by firing two goals. Marcel Clerents, Lyle Wiseman and Chuck Holdaway accounted for the Islanders other goals.

Although outplayed, the Miners were not outshot. They directed 36 shots on Islanders netminder Al Millar, who turned in a stand-out performance. Tom Lockhart in the Glace Bay net turned aside 22 shots.

Dr. W. H. Soper, who leaves for Portsmouth, N. H., this morning to engage in general practice in that city, was agreeably surprised on Saturday morning when waited upon by the staff of the Charlottetown Hospital and a representative delegation from the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The doctor will be accompanied to Portsmouth by his daughter Patricia and also his daughter Sylvia who is returning to school at Wakefield, Mass. Mrs. Soper will remain in Charlottetown for the present.

Russell Brown, 30, was being held in King's County Jail at Georgetown without charge last night following the wounding of his father-in-law, Allan Blaisdell, 67, at Brown's home in Dingwell's Mills late yesterday afternoon.

Blaisdell suffered a shattered rib and a wound in his arm. He was taken to hospital at Souris and shortly after removed by ambulance to hospital in Charlottetown. His condition was not regarded as critical.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police were called from Souris, some nine miles away, and later from Montague and Charlottetown. A tear gas squad was reported to have been alerted at Summerside when it was rumored Brown was threatening to barricade himself with a shotgun. However, he surrendered without resistance.

It was reported the shooting occurred after Blaisdell, with Brown's wife, two children and her sister arrived at the Brown home with a horse-drawn vehicle. Brown's own wife and one child had left the vehicle when the shot was fired from a 12 gauge gun.

Brown is scheduled to appear before St. Andrew's Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald at Georgetown this morning.

TUESDAY

Three members of the Summerside Fire Department were appointed last evening at the annual meeting to wait on the Mayor and Town Council and request consideration of the action of the Fire Committee of the Council in dismissing eight men from the Department. The members of the committee were Messrs. Ensor, Bowness, Heath Warren and J. C. Mountain.

Contracts amounting to \$130,000 for the construction of two chapels (Catholic and Protestant) at R.C.A.F. Station, Chatham, and contracts amounting to \$126,000 for the construction of two chapels at R.C.A.F. Station, Greenwood have been awarded by the Department of National Defence to the Prince Edward Island firm of M. F. Schurman.

Construction of these wooden frame buildings is expected to commence immediately.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, spoke before the Rotary Club, Charlottetown, yesterday during which he reviewed the agricultural position throughout Canada. Mr. Shaw dealt with the splendid state of production in agricultural products across Canada, and detailed the market trends during the year 1952, which indicated a lowering in the price of most farm commodities, while at the same time costs and labour supplies had increased. He dealt very clearly with the surplus position in meat products which had occurred chiefly because of an embargo in Canada's main export market in the

United States. In his outlook for the year 1953 he stated the prospects are for less production in agricultural products, lower prices of farm products, equally as high costs of operation, higher interest, tax and transportation rates, and a greater scarcity of farm labour at a higher cost.

Touching on the dairy industry he emphasized the tremendous value of the industry to Canada, which he estimated at over 700 million dollars annually to the farmer and to all those encouraged in processing. Two million Canadians are dependent on this industry which is the keystone of agricultural stability and farm conservation.

Mr. G. E. Hartien, local manager for Canada Packers, in commenting on the pork situation yesterday pointed out that deliveries to the local plant last week were just about double the normal, which left them with considerable above the average on hand. "Farmers have been wise," Mr. Hartien said, "in getting their hogs to the plant before the support price was reduced." He also pointed out that the same situation obtains throughout Canada, particularly in Toronto and the West.

WEDNESDAY

SYDNEY, Jan. 6 (CP)—Hub Beaudry's overtime marker at 6:41 of the sudden death extra session gave Charlottetown Islanders a 5-1 decision over Sydney Millionaires in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here tonight.

The Charlottetown win pushed their second place margin over the Moneybags to six points. This was the third overtime game in the last four starts for Sydney, and they got an even break, a win, a draw and a loss.

Mr. Harold MacLean was re-elected chairman of the Charlottetown Playgrounds Commission for the third consecutive time at their annual meeting last night, as was also Mr. Roy MacGillivray to the office of vice-chairman.

The commission strongly endorsed the plan for the use of the Forum for children's hockey practice on Saturday evenings instead of maintaining open air rinks. To this end they agreed to co-operate fully with the service clubs and others who are giving leadership to the project, and will assist in supervising this activity.

Other officers elected were Mr. James Robison, Treasurer and Miss Ethel Sutherland, Secretary.

Col. L. T. Lowther, O.B.E., principal of Prince Street School, and Mrs. Lowther have made available a ground floor room in their dwelling at 25 Longworth Avenue as a class room in an attempt to ease the crowded conditions at the school.

The room has been fully equipped to handle 20 grade one pupils, who will receive their schooling under Miss Mary Morrison, a member of the staff of Prince Street School.

Summerside Police Court yesterday morning was the scene of a lengthy discussion on the juvenile delinquency problem existing in Summerside.

Participating in the discussion which took place during the trial of two 18-year-old youths were Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C., Crown Prosecutor D. O. Stewart, Q.C., and Chief of Police Peter R. White.

The three men were in unanimous agreement that a serious juvenile problem existed in Summerside; that juveniles should be segregated from older prisoners, but agreed that facilities in the Prince County jail did not permit this to be done; and that the establishment of an industrial farm on the Island would provide healthy, useful, and reforming environment for many youths who had personalities that would permit them, with proper guidance, to develop into citizens who would lead good constructive lives.

The Board of School Trustees was urged to "proceed at once to prepare for the benefit of the Council a full and complete statement as to the probable cost of additional accommodation and also the cost of improvement to present curriculum in a resolution passed at a special meeting of the City Council here last night.

In moving the resolution, which was seconded by Coun. Elmer MacDonald, Coun. E. C. Johnstone said that the Council recognized the need for additional school accommodation and further recognized that the provision for such was the sole responsibility of the Board of School Trustees. He urged that the Board keep in mind the need for strict economy and it was further resolved that the Board request the Minister of Education to the possibility of securing assistance in respect to additional accommodation from the Provincial Treasurer.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. HECTOR MARTIN

The death of Mr. Hector Martin of 42 Rochford Street, Charlottetown, which occurred suddenly at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Harold McHardy of Reading, Mass., on December 3, removes a beloved citizen, and his passing brings deep sorrow to his immediate family as well as to his many friends throughout the Province, particularly in Prince County, where he was well and favorably known.

The deceased, who was in his 75th year, was born in Howland, P. E. I., on March 6, 1877, where he engaged in farming in the district and in addition operated a mail route for many years. On his retirement some sixteen years ago, he moved with his family to Charlottetown where he resided up till the time of his death.

On October last, the deceased, accompanied by Mrs. Martin, left for the United States to visit members of the family residing in Maine and Massachusetts, intending to remain for the winter months, and it was during his sojourn there that his sudden death occurred.

Five members of the immediate family, accompanied by Mrs. Martin, returned from the U.S. to attend the funeral, and it is notable that eleven of the children were in attendance.

The late Mr. Martin leaves to mourn his sudden passing a widow, the former Angeline Peters, a family of thirteen children, five sons and eight daughters, including the police force in Rumford; Edward and Wilfred in Charlottetown; Augustine with the R.C.A.F. in Summerside; Vincent in Rumford; Orella (Mrs. Frank Gallant) in Rumford; Ursella (Mrs. Ben Gallant) in Charlottetown; Lucy (Mrs. Edward Martin) in Reading; Mildred (Mrs. Harold McHardy); Betty (Mrs. Lloyd McIntyre) in Aylmer, Ont.; Edith (Mrs. Warren Gallant); Winnie (Mrs. L. R. Stanley) of Charlottetown; Helen (Mrs. Harold LeJune) in Sydney.

He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Jos. R. Gallant of O'Leary and Mrs. Hubert Arsenault of Egmont Bay.

Two of his children predeceased him some years ago, Helen at age seven, and Henry, who was accidentally drowned while serving with the armed forces in Newfoundland in 1940. The late Mr. Martin had five sons serving with the armed forces during World War II.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held from the Charlottetown Funeral Home to St. Mary's Basilica on December 6, where Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Francis Bolger, interment being in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

The pallbearers were Felix Arsenault, Reg MacNeill, Edward MacRae, William Matthews, Alban Arsenault and Arthur Gallant.
