CONTRACT BRIDGE

By E. JAY BECKER North dealer. East-West vulnerable. NORTH: ♠ J 8 7 6 5 4 3 2, ♥ A 10 7 6 5 4 3 2, ♦ A Q J 6, ♣ A Q J 6. WEST: ♠ K 7 5 3, ♥ A 10 7 5, ♦ Q 5, ♣ 8 7 3. EAST: ♠ Q 6 4 3, ♥ Q J 8 4, ♦ J 9 4, ♣ 5 3. SOUTH: ♠ A 10, ♥ K 6 4 3, ♦ K 8 2, ♣ K 10 9 4. The bidding: North East South West 1♣ Pass 2NT Pass 3♣ Pass 3NT

Opening lead—three of spades. Smart defense was required in this hand to defeat declarer in three trumps. South won the spade with the ace after East covered the jack with the queen. Declarer could count seven rapid winners. His best chance to obtain two more tricks lay in diamonds but since he did not want to subject himself to a heart lead by East through his king he decided to get the diamonds going by leading the suit from dummy. Accordingly he led a club to the jack intending to lead a low diamond from dummy and play the eight from his hand. He was willing to lose a diamond to West.

28 Are Charged In CBC Strike

MONTREAL (CP) — Striking CBC employees clashed with police Monday during a noisy one-hour demonstration. Twenty-eight persons, including labor leaders, actors and actresses, were arrested. The outbreak of violence, described as the most serious since the strike began Dec. 29, followed a mass meeting of striking French-language television producers and their sympathizers. The meeting, attended by an estimated 2,000 persons, endorsed the producers' action earlier Monday in breaking off negotiations with the CBC in Ottawa. The meeting took no decision on what the next move should be.

COOL OFFICER ARRESTED Among those arrested was Jean Marchand, secretary-general of the 90,000-member Canadian and Catholic Confederation of Labor which has been supporting the strikers. He was arrested as he tried to get through police lines to join pickets in front of the CBC building on midtown Dorchester Boulevard. Following the mass meeting, the strikers and their sympathizers lined up on Dorchester Blvd., for a one-mile march to the CBC building. Eye-witnesses said police intervened and tried to prevent the march, arresting one man as an example. The marchers broke ranks, got around the police barrier and then resumed their walk along the boulevard. Police, some on horseback and some in patrol cars, rushed to the CBC building and waited for the parade. When the demonstrators arrived police prevented them from mounting the sidewalk and ordered them to keep moving. The demonstrators tussled with police and then most took up positions on a sidewalk opposite the CBC building. When patrol cars moved away with some of the arrested, the demonstrators pelted the cars with mud picked up from Mont.

Publishing Co. Founder Dies

SENEVILLE, Que. (CP)—James John Harpell, 85, founder of the Industrial and Educational Publishing Company, and a prominent philanthropist, died Saturday at his home here. He founded his publishing company in Toronto in 1911 and four years later established a branch in Montreal. It was moved to suburban Ste. Anne de Bellevue in 1918. In 1929 he turned over a number of trade publications he published to his employees who continued to operate them under the name of National Business Publications. In 1949 he transferred his entire business to the employees of both his plants. They now operate separately under the names of Garden City Press Co-operative, Toronto, and Harpell Press Co-operative, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, Que.
