Youth Given Two Years

SUMMERSIDE — Norbert Earl Yeo, 16, of Summerside was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary in town police court yesterday.

Town Police Court this morning on each of three charges of break and entry with intent to commit an indictable offence and on a fourth charge of break, entry and theft. The sentences are to run concurrently.

The break, entry and theft occurred July 31 at the Convent Street Grocers. He was also charged with breaking and entering the store July 8.

The two other charges arose from breaks into the Atlantic Finance and MacArthur properties Ltd. July 30.

In passing sentence, Magistrate R. S. Hinton, QC, told the accused he could receive a total of 36 years with a maximum of 14 years on each charge.

There was little competition yesterday as various sheep breeds were judged at the provincial exhibition and livestock show. Six breeds were shown and in each case it was not unusual to see one breeder sweep nearly all classes for the particular breed he specializes in.

Brian Stewart, Charlottetown, won seven first prizes for his showing in the Shropshire Downs division, including the champion male and champion female.

His only competition came from S. C. Stewart and Sons, RR 3, Charlottetown, whose entry in the pen of one male and three females took first prize.

Six out of nine first prizes in the North County Cheviot section went to Almon Boswall, RR 3, Charlottetown. Mr. Boswall showed the champion male and champion female in this division. Animals shown by Allison Stewart, RR 3, Charlottetown, picked up two firsts in this division.

TAKES ALL CLASSES

All nine classes in the Border Cheviots division, including champion male and champion female, were won by sheep owned by Lincoln Boswall, RR 3, Charlottetown.

Similarly, all nine classes in the Leicesters breed division went to Ralph Stewart, RR 3, Charlottetown.

Eight out of nine classes in the Suffolk breed division were won by Allison Stewart, RR 3, Charlottetown. In this division, Wilfred W. Stewart, RR 3 Charlottetown, was awarded first prize

Possession Of Stolen Bike Costs Accused \$10 Fine

Lloyd Harry Shaw of West Royalty was fined \$10 and costs or five days yesterday in city police court for possession of a stolen bicycle. The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge.

Owner of the bicycle, Christopher Tweel, 11, Admiral Street said he had last seen the bike Monday evening when he had left it in the bicycle parking area opposite the exhibition grounds.

He said he had never seen the accused before yesterday.

Also testifying for the crown were the boy's father, Daniel Tweel, and police constables Sidney Hurry and Matthew Acorn.

Const. Hurry said he had found the bicycle in the possession of the accused at 12:15 yesterday.

The accused told the court the vehicle had been loaned to him by "a young fellow" at the grounds.

Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, in giving the penalty, commented that there have been many reports of stolen bicycles lately and, "if a similar case comes up again it will be \$50".

"It might not be a fine," he added.

In other cases, Melvin Clarkin, Charlottetown, was remanded to Aug. 23 on a charge of disorderly conduct.

OTTAWA — A Charlottetown firm, Canada Packers Ltd., has been awarded three contracts by the department of defence production; it was announced here by industry minister C. M. Drury.

Two of the contracts, for the supply of meat, are valued at \$26,516 and \$22,203. The third, for the supply of fowl, is valued at \$10,449.

Island Propane Gas Ltd. of Summerside was awarded a \$31,700 contract for the supply of liquefied petroleum gas.

The contracts are among 125 unclassified defence contracts awarded by the department.

Peters-Owned Shorthorn Tops Fat Steer Class

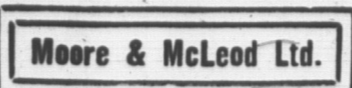
