## Gordon Yeo Describes Escape From Flames

SUMMERSIDE — Prince County hospital authorities last night described the condition of Gordon Yeo, Summerside, who was injured in a fire that swept his office and warehouse late Sunday night.

It was not immediately known Sunday night how the fire had begun, because Mr. Yeo had been found unconscious near the burning building when firemen arrived.

It was learned yesterday that an oil stove was responsible for starting the fire. Mr. Yeo had the stove in his office when he went to the plant and apparently some oil was spilled on the floor and caught fire.

Mr. Yeo discovered the floor on fire when he returned about an hour later.

He at first attempted to extinguish the fire by throwing sand and gravel on it. When he

thought the fire was under control, he tried to lift the stove, lost his balance, and the oil in the stove ignited, causing the fire to explode.

The explosion caused the only door to the office to slam shut and lock on the outside.

Mr. Yeo then smashed a window in the office and leaped through into the warehouse. Realizing it was useless to try and kill the growing flames, he ran to the rear of the warehouse, where he effected his escape.

The smoke, flames and shock apparently overcame Mr. Yeo, causing him to lose consciousness.

## Illegal Use Of Marked Gas Probed

## Stamps Dazzle Ti-Cats 38-21

HAMILTON (CP) — Calgary Stampede, with quarter back Eagle Day mixing plays with the authority of a mastercraftsman, ran and passed Hamilton Tiger-Cats last Monday night for a 38-21 victory over the eastern conference leaders in a Canadian Football League interlocking game.

The Stampede spotted Tiger-Cats an early 6-0 lead, then wrapped up their fifth straight victory with a 26-point second quarter. With the game safely tucked away in the final 20 minutes, the westerners eased up and Hamilton, with Joe Zuger calling the signals, scored two touchdowns.

The Tiger-Cats, ineffectual at times almost downright against the feet running of Ed Buchanan, the superb pass-catcher of Pete Manning and the easy Calgary, with the late Coleman, had 22,109 Civic Stadium fans brooding at them as time after time they clawed at the air in frantic efforts to halt the first-up Stampede.

The loss left Hamilton with 11 points, three more than the second-place Ottawa Rough Riders and the Calgary, with 11 starts, pulled to within one point of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, west of league-competitors who met British Columbia Lions at Vancouver Monday night.

## Baseplate Change Expected To Open New Export Doors

OTTAWA (CP)—A legislative change which is hoped will open new export doors under the government program of financing capital goods exports will be presented to the new parliament, it was learned Monday.

On the face of it, the change appears minor. It would extend to the government's loan direct to foreign importers instead of to the exporter of capital equipment or services.

But the absence of such an arrangement, an official said Monday, has already meant the loss of one potential overseas sale in the Middle East.

The thinking in the trade department which administers the export financing plan is that the new arrangement by providing a line of credit to foreign buyers and especially foreign governments, would make possible export sales that wouldn't otherwise be made.

The change would put the Canadian program on a par with the facilities provided United States capital goods manufacturers by the American export import bank.

HAD GOOD START  
The Canadian financing plan in operation last Monday, has gotten off to a fast start with a number of export deals to its credit. But there have been no new ones for the first two months and the latest financing arrangement — \$40,000,000 in boxes to Argentina—has been deferred due to financial reactions in Argentina which.

So far the government has financed \$5,000,000 in exports—mainly locomotives, steel rails and a pulp and paper mill in Latin America—and has given commitments in principle for another \$75,000,000.

One informant said it isn't correct to say the government's program is in a slump. There were a substantial number of potential export deals already being worked. But the exporters still had to close their deals with the foreign buyers—a process which sometimes takes a extended negotiations.

Though Canada lost a prospective sale of storage tanks to Israel, other projects are shaping up involving that country and others in the Middle East. Federal financing has even been sought for exports to a few of the more developed countries, including Japan.

As well, the government has guaranteed lines of credit for its two big commonwealth partners in Asia — \$20,000,000 for India and \$15,000,000 for Pakistan. But under the old method, this money could only be loaned through the U.S. government and not direct to the overseas governments.

## Yank Scientist Given Asylum By Cuban Gov't

HAVANA (AP) — A Cuban newspaper said Monday an American scientist has been granted asylum here after he claimed that the U.S. government was run by a "team of lunatics."

The newspaper Revolution said Richard Burrell, 33, his wife and two daughters have fled to Cuba since a few days ago and that he now is teaching physics and mathematics at the university here.

"My major desire consists in being useful to the construction of socialism in Cuba," he was quoted him as saying. He pleaded his last job in the United States as being with the highest research laboratories. He was not further identified here.

He was quoted as saying the U.S. defence department contracts scientists and that proceeded to make life impossible for those holding "progressive attitudes." He said the U.S. government conditions in America as "precarious and unfavorable."
