

Ch'town Golfer Wins CN Trophy

MONCTON, August 18 — A six foot six North Sydney special agent in the investigation department captured the Canadian National Atlantic Region Golf Championship Wednesday with a sizzling low net of 62 at the Moncton Golf and Country Club.

W.L.A. Fraser, a native of the Fredericton area, broke 40 for the first time Wednesday with a 39 on the back nine and a 47 out. He has been in North Sydney since 1953 and has been golfing for the past three years.

"Everything was going right for me on the back nine," he said. "This is a terrific course for a long-ball hitter and I was hitting the ball better than ever before."

E.C. Taylor of Charlottetown won the Howard C. Grayson trophy awarded for the first time this year to pensioners and senior players. Mr. Taylor scored a low net of 64 while Bud Kennedy of Moncton came in

with a low gross of 71 to win the Tibbets Paints trophy.

Approximately 145 golfers from all parts of the region competed in the day-long tournament. Entrants were from as far away as Toronto, Montreal and Lennoxville.

Twenty-nine year old Mr. Kennedy of the Internal Audit Department came to Moncton last year from Saint John. He played out of the Riverside Club for 15 years and played on Wellington cup teams for two years.

Mr. Taylor won the Tibbets Paints Trophy last year with his low gross of 73. He equalled that score Wednesday but it wasn't good enough to beat Kennedy's 71 — the lowest low gross in the 37-year history of the tournament.

Mr. Taylor, superintendent of CN's P.E.I. Division, at 56 started playing golf when he was 42 years old, said last night he couldn't catch up to Kennedy's pace.

The course was in excellent

shape and the greens were exceptionally good. The competitors expressed their appreciation for the excellent manner in which the tournament was handled by the tournament manager, C.T. Rideout.

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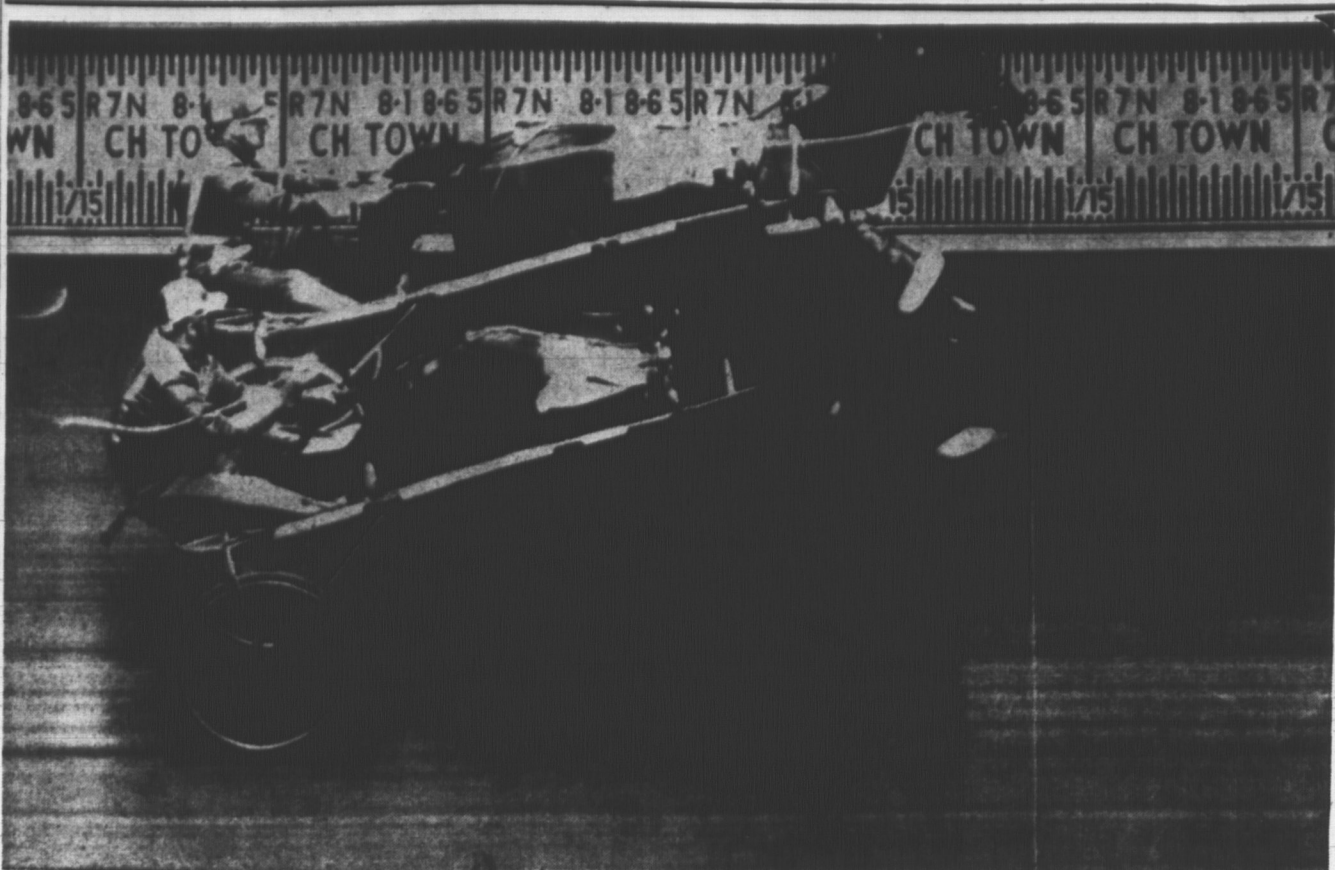

Many Changes In Race Game

The pari-mutuel wickets at the Charlottetown Driving Park have been swarming with bettors this week and things will likely be in high gear at the local oval before the close of the week with the annual Gold Cup and Saucer parade scheduled for Friday.

The patrons of the race game are from various generations and the folks belonging to the older generations must be slightly taken back with the numerous changes in the race game over the years. For example, a great many local race fans will recall the days previous to the present when the greatest single break-through in the harness game, with the photo finish cameras running a close second. Judges did their best before the camera was placed at the finish, but there isn't a judge operating over a period of years who often doesn't wonder how many he called incorrectly before the camera was introduced to the game. After all they are human and they have only one pair eyes and they could only do their best.

Arguments still arise between the judges, horsemen and bettors, but the judges are in a more comfortable position with regard to who won the race as the photo tells the tale and it is available to anyone wishing to see it after the presiding judge has declared the winner.

The judges are very co-operative with both the horsemen and the bettors in permitting them as much freedom as possible to witness how the wheels turn in the execution of a race program.

The draw for each race held his week is held a day ahead of race day and the horsemen have been taking part in the draw all this week under the supervision of the track officials so that drivers and owners may witness how their scoring positions are decided.

Action resumes at the local oval this afternoon with an eight dash card set to leave the wire at 2:30 and the evening program gets underway at 8:30 p.m.
