THE TUPPER CLUB.

The formation of the Tupper Club in this city was a capital idea, capably carried out. The club at once enlisted the ability of the earnest, active young men of our city. It took a foremost part in the highly successful demonstrations of welcome and honor to Canada's Grand Old Man and his eloquent lieutenant, and it is prepared to carry on the fight to a triumphant and glorious issue.

THE P. E. ISLAND EXHIBITION.

It is pleasing to learn that the exhibition to be held here next week will be the largest and best ever held in Prince Edward Island. The energetic and able secretary of the Exhibition Company is just now busily employed in taking entries of intending exhibitors and preparing for the great event.

SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY.

It is pleasing to learn that Mr. Callaghan, of the Registry Office, has been employing his leisure hours towards the development here of the sugar beet enterprise. According to a statement published by the Patriot, Mr. Callaghan has, for some time past, been in correspondence with the Jefferson Beet Sugar Company, of Watertown, New York, and has persuaded them,

to establish a beet sugar factory in this province, costing \$500,000, provided the farmers would guarantee to devote 3,000 acres of land for the production of the sugar beet. They would require altogether 5,000 acres, but once assured of the 3,000 they would purchase the balance themselves. They agree to pay the farmer \$4 per ton for the beets, and \$1 per ton more if they receive one cent per pound bonus on the manufactured sugar from the Dominion Government; to supply the seed free for the first year; to send forth, at their own expense, experts to give all necessary information regarding cultivation of the soil, sowing of the seed, weeding, thinning and harvesting of the beet; to pay expense of transportation to the factory, and to return gratis to the farmer the refuse pulp which makes excellent feed for cattle and hogs.

The prices quoted are equal to 12c and 16c per bushel for the beets supplied to the factory. Taking into account the return of pulp, this ought to pay our farmers pretty well,—as well indeed as anything else. If they can raise five hundred bushels per acre, the return per acre at 14 cents per bushel will be \$60, or \$110 from two acres, which the company asks each farmer to set apart for the growth of sugar beets.

The land will, of course, require careful cultivation and fertilization; but given these, sugar beets will grow as well here as in any other part of the world.

This enterprise is one to which Dr. McNeil, of this city, and Mr. Alexander Math, the untiring and watchful representative of Belfast, have given considerable attention in recent years. If Mr. Callaghan has succeeded in inducing the Watertown company to place it upon the business basis described by The Patriot he has done well and deserves great credit. Every enterprise that will profitably employ capital and labor and bring money into the country or prevent it from going out, ought to be hailed with pleasure and promoted by the people.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship Bishop Macdonald yesterday afternoon administered the Sacrament of Confirmation at South Shore to about twenty persons.

SCHOONER ASHORE.—The schr. Evening Star is reported ashore at West Cap. Capt. Brown and crew escaped with difficulty. The Evening Star was coming to Charlottetown with a cargo of lumber for Duchemin & Co.

AWAITING AN OWNER.—A small bark value containing a quantity of men's underclothing, was picked up some time ago in a yard in the vicinity of the Cameron Block. The value is in the hands of the police, and can be seen at the station.

DISTRESS AT LABRAD R.—Reports from northern Labrador reveal the existence of great distress among the fishermen, owing to the ice remaining on the coast so long. Many vessels have been crushed in the floes, losing their supplies and fishing outfits. The others are meeting with but poor success. The Labrador cod fishery is virtually a failure.

INVALIDED CANADIANS.—A London cable states that the invalided Canadians who were to have sailed by the Corinthian for Canada on Thursday, will not depart until the 13th inst., a week later. Sergt. Edward Hessian, of Georgetown, will be a passenger. Private Walker, as already announced, will also come out by the Corinthian.

ELECTIONS SOON.—An Ottawa despatch says: the liberal party workers here laugh at the stories in circulation that the elections will be postponed till January. As a matter of fact their preparations are all being made on the understanding that dissolution will take place within a week or ten days from the present time. The printing of the voters' list is almost completed.

ART FOR EXHIBITION.—No doubt our art workers are very busy these days preparing their articles for exhibition. Some good prizes are given for paintings, among them being \$3 for first and \$2 for second for landscape oil paintings, animal (oil) from life, and portrait from life (human). 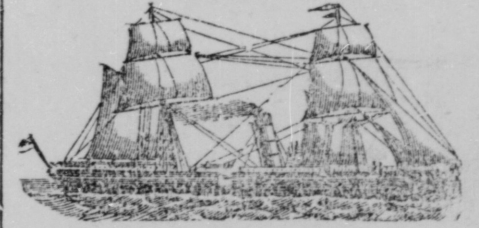
