### Local and Other Notes.

#### Gleaned by the Guardian Reporters

ST. JAMES' concert tomorrow evening. Rev. J. CARUTHERS and Mr. Unsworth are at Pictou, awaiting the Stanley.

There is some talk of the Fireman repeating their concert on the 17th of March, in Summerside. It was a success financially in Charlottetown.

The heavy rains the last of the week softened the ice down considerably and several horses broke through at the landing near the city on Saturday.

Mr. J. T. DOWLING, who was for many years foreman in the Patriot Office is dying in Victoria, B. C. Mr. Dowling is a native of Fredericton, N. B., but was well and favorably known in this city.

MR. DANIEL MCKENZIE, who is well known throughout the Island, on Wednesday last became dangerously ill, and had to be removed by his friends to the asylum. Dr. Blanchard considers his case hopeless.

REV. ROSALD MACDONALD, S. J., preached in St. Dunstan's Cathedral last night. He announced that he would preach a series of sermons, beginning next Sunday evening, on the Unity, Catholicity and Apostolicity of the Church.

The subject under discussion at the Teachers' Meeting in the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday evening was "The best methods of teaching Arithmetic in Primary Departments." Miss Brown read an interesting paper on the topic, and the discussion was participated in generally by the teachers.

"AUTHOR'S DAY" is the latest departure in city school work. The idea is, the sitting apart one afternoon each month for children to study the life and works of some Author; its object to inculcate a love of the study of Literature by the young. Author day was successfully carried out in Upper Prince St. School on Friday afternoon under the direction of Mr. J. D. Seaman, Principal. The Author chosen was Jean Ingelow, and a very interesting programme was given to the pupils, consisting of Biographical Sketches of the Author's life, Recitations and Music, selections from the Author's Works. Every department except the Infant took part in the entertainment. The singing consisting of duets and choruses, under the direction of Miss Haslam were very well done. "Robin Burns" was chosen as the Author for the next day.

The Halifax Mail says: "The students of Pine Hill Theological College have for the past four weeks enjoyed the advantages of instruction in elocution from Rev. James Caruthers, of Charlottetown. Yesterday afternoon a course of twenty-four lectures given by him was closed with an exhibition of the art, done. There were present members of the senate, city ministers and some clergymen from the country. The instruction given was on the same principle as that at the Boston School of Oratory. In the exercises by the students illustrations were given of the work of the whole course. The first part of the programme showed the different modes of breathing, so that a public speaker may deliver his address, speech or sermon in the most natural way. First was deep breathing, illustrating diaphragmatic breathing. This evidenced the students to have acquired a good knowledge of the use of all the muscles of the body relating to vocal culture. Then followed illustrations of the utilization of breath, vowel moulding and articulation, emphasis, inflection, pitch and stress. In all of these the students showed themselves well versed. The students did remarkably well, and speeches were made congratulating pupils, college and instruction by Rev. Messrs. Morrison, McMillan, McPherson and Simpson, Professor Currie, Dr. Forrest, Rev. Mr. Leake of LaHave. Rev. Mr. Caruthers leaves for home this morning, after his very successful season at Pine Hill college.

### In Memoriam.

Never perhaps in the history of Mt. Stewart has there occurred such a peculiarly sad and distressing event as the very sudden death on Saturday evening last, of Miss Laura K. McWilliams, dearly beloved daughter of Daniel McWilliams, section foreman on the P. E. I. R. The particulars of the sad affair are as follows: On that evening she deceased in company with her sister Eva and the Misses Sullivan, went out for a walk, in the course of which they visited two or three stores where they made some purchases and were returning home conversing pleasantly to each other, and when about opposite the residence of Mr. William Vickerson, the deceased suddenly exclaimed: "Oh dear," and fell to the ground. She was immediately carried into the nearest store, and in a few moments Dr. J. G. Toombs was kneeling by the prostrate form of the poor girl. A brief examination convinced the doctor that life was extinct, giving as his opinion that heart trouble was the cause and that death was instantaneous. The opinion is concurred in by Dr. Walsh, who viewed the body a short time afterward. The deceased was in her 17th year and was a universal favorite with all who enjoyed her acquaintance. The sorrowing father and mother and the remaining members of the family, whose grief was painful to witness, have the profoundest sympathy of the whole community in their terrible and sudden bereavement. But they mourn not as those without hope. The funeral services were conducted at the home of the deceased, Tuesday afternoon, by Rev. A. B. Macleod and F. Slaekford, after which the remains were conveyed to the quiet little churchyard, followed by a large procession of sympathizing friends, where all that was mortal of sweet, gentle Laura was peacefully laid to rest.

#### A Day's Budget of Western Items.

The Orpheus Glee Club will meet tonight at Ludlow Hall.

The fire bell will call the members of the Beaver Fire Company to practice this afternoon.

An army of stone breakers will begin work this morning on the large heap of stones on Market Square, and the west end piles.

A black fur tippet was left at the Crystal Rink on carnival night. The owner can get the same by applying to the secretary.

Four mussel mud diggers are busy on favorable days, and raise from eight to ten carloads of that fertilizer daily, the largest quantity of which goes by rail to the country.

The basket social, under the auspices of the Epworth League, was postponed from Friday evening last until tomorrow night, when it will be held in the ladies' parlour, Ludlow Hall.

The School Teachers' Literary Society meets every Monday afternoon in the Davies school. Criticism on James Russell Lowell's "Holy Grail" and Tennyson's poem by the same name will occupy their attention this afternoon.

We understand a Young Ladies' Literary Club has been formed and will meet every Saturday evening in the Y. M. C. A. rooms. Principal Neil McLeod has kindly consented to become director of this society until the usual parliamentary rules become thoroughly understood by the members.

FIRE AT KENSINGTON.—On Friday night, at 11:30 o'clock, Mr. John McNeill was going home, he observed smoke issuing from the roof of Hon. G. W. Bently's store. He gave the alarm at once; but first followed the smoke which appeared near the chimney a few seconds later, and warned the neighbors of the danger. Very soon the inhabitants reached the spot, though not until the flames had the building in its grasp. An attempt was immediately made to save some goods and the front door was broken open, but the fire came through the office door in the rear end of the building so fiercely that the willing hands were only able to save about \$300 worth of goods from the well filled shelves of general merchandise. Soon after the first alarm was given the fire bell was sounded and the little antiquated engine was brought forth and threw its feeble stream into the building without any effect. Buckets of water were thrown rapidly on the next building, Dr. Darrach's dwelling, which now owes its safety to the down falling rain and the willing hands that piled the water rapidly on the scorching shingles. The wind was blowing from the north east, and the scale house, a few feet from the upper side of the building, was not burned. The best work of the little engine was done on the warehouses which were in the track of the fire at the rear of the store. By its work the fire was kept from spreading. A short time after the first alarm the store and contents were consumed and a blacken heap of cinders remained where the shop stood a short time before. A number of people from the country, even from Margate, saw the lurid light and drove into Kensington to offer their assistance. Mr. Bently, who lives some distance from his shop, arrived at the fire too late to be of much service in saving anything particular. The fire was caused by a defective flue. Loss about \$7,000, covered by insurance.
