Program For Senior Citizens Stressed At Liberal Meeting

"Additional assistance to all our senior citizens now receiving old age pensions, but who still require further financial assistance, could have been made on PEI ever since the present government took office seven years ago," Don Anderson and Frank Sigsworth, Liberal candidates in Second King's, informed a Liberal rally in the Monticello school last night. "But the provincial Tories have shown themselves to be either incapable of the administration involved in accomplishing this," said Mr. Sigsworth, "or they must face the indictment of being coldly indifferent to the total financial needs of our aging citizens despite the seductively extravagant election claims and empty protestations they so blatantly make to the contrary."

"For no less than seven years these supplementary payments could have been made also to all persons already receiving payments through Old Age Assistance, Blind Pensions and disabled Pensions as well. Every province from Ontario to the West Coast," the young lawyer asserted, "has an operative plan for such universal supplementary benefits to all its pensioners." So it is that the 12-point Liberal Program pledges "sound and efficient government" and, at the same time, guarantees all senior citizens a pension of one hundred dollars per month.

Hailing the energetic Liberal Leader, Alex Campbell, as the most promising heir-apparent to the Premier's office in the living history of the Island, Don Anderson recalled for his audience the Liberal Leader's pledge to be "a real friend of the farmers."

Mr. Anderson deplored that under the present government "school taxes have soared to an unprecedented high with the rural Islanders writing under the heaviest burden of these taxes." The young St. Peter's farmer stressed that "to relieve this oppressive burden a Liberal government is pledged to a far-seeing program which will result in the complete abolition of all school taxes. What rural Islander can do other than support such Liberal initiative," he concluded.

Chairman of the meeting was Mr. Angus MacDonald.

York. Others may be offered air transport.

The strike came as the British economy is convalescing from a sterling crisis and trying to reorganize itself for a stronger fight in overseas markets.

POUND SLIPS

Fears of the consequences on the economy were reflected on foreign exchange markets. The pound slipped from Friday's official price of \$2.79245 (U.S.) to \$2.79165 at the close of Monday's trading.

It was the lowest level since speculators attacked the pound last September and the Bank of England bought pounds to support future prices of Britain's currency.

Panic buying was reported in a few fruit and vegetable markets by retailers.

Prices of imported foods, especially potatoes, went up. Prices of lettuce and tomatoes, also imported at this time of year, were higher.

Neither management nor union showed any immediate inclination to give way. Ford Geddes, chairman of the Shipping Federation, said the employers' last offer of a 13-per cent increase in three years is as far as they could go.

The seamen demanded a 17-per cent package immediately. Basic wage is about \$42 for a 56-hour week. The seamen say they have to work up to 80 hours a week to earn the average pay of \$56. They want a 40-hour week with overtime and other benefits.

The compromise proposed by the government during pre-strike talks was a full inquiry into working conditions and an immediate three-per cent increase. The shippers agreed; the union did not.

The Liberal Party has two women candidates, the first time women have run in a provincial election.

Mr. Parker Canfield opposes speaker of the last House, in First Queens. Mrs. B. Earle MacDonald opposes Conservative J. David Stewart in Sixth Queens. Mr. Stewart was also a member of the last Legislature.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION COURSE CLOSES

The 15-weeks annual Marriage preparation course of St. Dunstan's Basilica closed last night with the celebration of Holy Mass by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown. Rev. P. F. MacDonald is seen presenting graduating diplomas to Joan Connolly and Sterling Creamer. The presentations to 140 graduates were made at a banquet held at the Basilica Recreation Center last night. The course, which began Jan. 31, included lectures by experts in areas of marriage and marriage life. The aim of the course was to help young people to prepare themselves to fulfill their role in married life with success and happiness.

Stadium Financial Picture Said Brighter This Year

report to the Town Council at its monthly meeting last night stated that its financial picture at the end of the first four months is much brighter than it has been for several years.

Stadium manager Charles Hogan in his report said the stadium showed an operating profit in excess of \$3,000 as of April 30th and this amount is over \$1,300 better than in 1965, nearly \$1,600 better than in 1964 and over \$3,300 better than in 1962.

The chairman of the Civic Stadium committee, Councillor Milton Mellish, felt Mr. Hogan should be commended for his fine effort.

The council was told that since tax accounts for this year were mailed out last Thursday, a total of \$17,000 in taxes has been paid.

Following considerable discussion, it was moved that first Street remain a one-way street, rather than two-way between Granville and Central Streets.

The chairman of the police committee, Councillor D. Alex MacDonald, reported that a radar set has been ordered for the police department and commented that this is not being done as a money making scheme but rather to cut down on speeders.

A motion was passed that electric superintendent T.E. Richardson be released from his position at his request on June 1st.

The reason for the motion is that in his contract Mr. Richardson had to tender a three-month notice of resignation and his notice will not have expired by June 1st when he has another position awaiting him.

Councillor Grant Mollison reported that the three-planting project begun by the town has been completed with 424 trees planted in various areas in the town.

Reporting on industrial development, Councillor Grant Mollison stated that the committee dealing with this matter is in the process of recommending that a commission be formed to handle industrial development.

Councillor Frances Perry stated that the centennial commission has been very active. The commission, she said, consists of 12 members who have been divided into four units of three apiece. Each unit will be responsible for a certain period of the planned program for centennial year.

A resolution was passed accepting the tender of F. Everett Cameron at \$312.86 for the installation of ductwork at the electric light plant.

A letter from Hon. Henry Wedge, chairman of the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation stated that as the province has now established the P.E.I. Housing Authority to deal with low rental housing, it is requesting that the group undertake the construction of such houses in Summerside if it is the town's feelings.

Mayor Key suggests that a reply to the letter be sent to the corporation stating the town is "certainly interested in this low rental housing scheme."

The council was also told that two comfort stations have been installed and that workmen are in the process of building a camp fire site for cubs, scouts etc.

Deep Water Produces Lobsters

SOURIS — Lobster catches here since the start of the season are reported as being average catches. Some fishermen are making good catches on fishing grounds far from shore while others, operating on shallow banks, are finding the fishing poor.

North Lake catches are reported to be similar to those in Souris with the majority of catches being made in about 14 fathoms of water. Last week rough water and high winds prevented some fishermen from getting to their gear and made it rough for those who went.

\$10 Penalty Is Imposed

In Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, Richard Joseph Arsenault of St. Nicholas, charged with angling with more than one fishing pole, was fined \$10 and costs. Provincial Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, presided.

The charge of passing a stopped school bus formerly laid against Loman Harold Bell, City, was withdrawn by Alan Scales, prosecutor.

James Harry Graham, Gaspereaux, charged with driving while his licence was suspended had his case adjourned to May 18th. Counsel for the accused is Kenneth MacDonald.
