Two S'ide Men Will Face Charge

SUMMERSIDE—Two Summerside men were apprehended in Port Elgin, N.B., yesterday afternoon by police and were brought back to Summerside last night to face a charge of robbery with violence.

William MacEwen, Summerside was beaten and robbed of over \$200 about noon yesterday in the west end by two men who allegedly dragged him out of a house and beat him about the face and head. He was taken to Prince County Hospital for treatment but was not admitted.

The two thieves reportedly hired a car to take them to the ferry at Borden and after arriving at Cape Tormentine hired another car and were reported heading for Saint John.

However they stopped in Port Elgin where police had been alerted and were taken into custody after being recognized from the description forwarded by local police.

The duo were returned to Summerside by Police Officers Hardy and MacKinnon last night. They are expected to appear in court this morning.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a low pressure system south of the district is expected to move northeastward. Rain and strong north-east winds are forecast to spread across most of the district. The precipitation will become showery as the low moves away late today.

Forecasts: Mainland Nova Scotia, Lower St. John River Valley: Overcast with showers; continuing cool; northeast winds 25, diminishing by evening to north-easterly 15. Low-high at Halifax 47 and 52, Yarmouth 50 and 55, Kentville 47 and 56, New Glasgow 45 and 58, Goshen 42 and 55, Fredericton and Saint John 48 and 55.

Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties: Overcast, showers beginning in afternoon; continuing cool; northeast winds 25. Low-high at Sydney 42 and 50, Charlottetown 46 and 55, Moncton 48 and 55.

Upper St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Variable cloudiness becoming overcast with a few showers during morning; cool; Northeast winds 16. Low-high at Edmundston 46 and 57, Campbellton 48 and 53.
