### FORERUNNERS OF THE RETURN.

Flags flying from every masthead of the steamer Northumberland, last evening, gave to the people of Summerside the first certain intimation that two of our heroes from the battlefield were returning to their native land—fore-runners, as we hope, of all the rest. The crowd on the wharf was unusually large, even for Summerside; and when, towards the end of the long procession which filed out of the Northumberland, the boys in khaki appeared a hearty cheer of welcome met the air. There was, also, real old-fashioned hand-shaking when Messrs. Wayne and McCarthy stood upon their native timber. Both, bronzed with the sun, are pictures of good health. McCarthy has quite recovered from an attack of enteric fever; and Wayne's wounded limb, though still a little stiff at times, may be said to be quite well. In conversation with a representative of THE EXAMINER they said that they were glad that they had had the experience notwithstanding all they had gone through—and both seemed delighted beyond measure to be at home again and among friends once more. Wayne says that he would not give an acre in P. E. Island for the whole of South Africa; McCarthy somewhat more guarded expressed the opinion that British men and capital will, after the war, make of British South Africa a great and prosperous country. As to the conduct of the campaign, the statements of both bear out, in a striking manner, the news that came to us from time to time by means of the telegraph. Their great regret seems to be that the Boers are "careful not to let the British get at them." Adept at taking cover and "sniping," they slip away in the night, when hard pressed, rather than risk a decisive action. Mr. McCarthy is not at all surprised at the prolongation of the war or the occasional "surprises" received by the British; and he believes that it will take the British at least a year to "round up" the elusive enemy. While in England they received "the best of good treatment" in the great military hospital at Shorncliffe, and were altogether favorably impressed with the Motherland, though they think that it is no place for a poor man and that the climate is—well, not quite so good to ours. They had a rough passage from England to Quebec, and were greatly pleased with the warmth of their reception along the line. At Hunter River Mr. Wayne's company was drawn up in line, when the train arrived, and the welcome returned received the warmest of welcomes home. At Charlottetown thousands surrounded the station and McCarthy was given a hearty reception on his way to Souris.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—There are two Johns very prominently before the world today, viz., John Bull and John Chinaman. And John Bull may soon be heard from in the China shop!

—They are betting six to four on McKinley against Bryan in New York. It is McKinley and sound money, pro-British and expansion. It is Bryan and 16 to 1—pro-Boer and anti-trust. The indications are that the Democratic platform will be badly damaged on election day.

—Admiral Sir Edward Seymour, who figures so prominently in the despatches, is not new to Chinese ways and warfare. He was in the war of 1856-60, and aided in the capture of Canton in 1857 and the taking of the Peiho forts in 1858. He has been on the station as commander since 1897, and probably knew as well as anyone the perils of the march he undertook for the relief of the Europeans in Peking.

### THE END APPROACHING.

The Liberals in office refuse to believe that there is a reaction throughout Canada in favor of the Conservative party, and accept as gospel the assurances of the subsidized press upon this point. But, as the Ottawa Citizen points out, if they would lift up their eyes they would see the whitening fields of a Tory victory rivaling that of 1878. It will be garnered in three months, or whenever the people are permitted to record their votes. The word of Conservatives will not be accepted by the deluded Liberal leaders; they will refuse likewise the warning of their friends? The Truro (N. S.) Headlight, announces the coming change and says:—

"Tuesday night last a Truro gentleman received a letter from a friend in Ontario. From a political standpoint the letter is quite a surprise, as the writer has been known as an out and out Liberal, now he declares that the government must and will go no matter when the elections are brought on. The gentleman in question has no personal grievance against the government, never sought office nor favors, in any way, he condemns them as an old Liberal who has weighed his party in power in the balance and found it wanting. They have not practised what they preached. The gentleman in question has much to do with organized labor and has gone in and out amongst the laboring class from Ottawa to Vancouver, meeting as he puts it all sorts and conditions of men. From what he has heard and seen, he is sure the Conservatives will sweep the country from Ottawa to Vancouver."

### THE FOOD SCANDAL

THE papers are still discussing the emergency food scandal and the white-washing report brought in by the Liberal members of the committee of the House of Commons appointed to investigate such of the charges as Premier Laurier and his followers allowed to go before them. Some of the comments are very interesting. The Hamilton Spectator, for instance, is of the opinion that the food might have been worse. Here is its reference to the subject:—

Speaking of the Borden Bogus Bouillon outrage, the Dundas Banner says: "The most that can be said against the emergency ration, the little extra that the government sent to the men, is that it was not as strong as it should have been." Yes, that's "the most that can be said." It was not a deadly poison. It was not a ration of Rough on Rats or hydrocyanic acid. But had our brave boys in Africa been forced to depend upon the stuff as an emergency ration—for the purpose for which it was sent by Dr. Borden—they would have died just as certainly as if "Vitalian" were a deadly poison. It wasn't strong enough. That was all that ailed it. And in making that admission the Banner admits the whole charge against Borden and the government."
