Plenty of Meadow Mice were there, but they were safe in the little runways or tunnels they had dug under the snow. Only if one should be foolish enough to come up on top of the snow would Reddy have the least chance of catching one.

It was very early in the morning. The Black Shadows had just begun to hurry back to the Purple Hill to spend the day. No one was yet up at Farmer Brown's house. Reddy headed straight for the dooryard there. There was a chance just a chance, that Bowser the Hound might have left a bone with a little meat on it lying about. It had happened in the past. Bowser didn't always eat all his food. Sometimes he had too much. Never in all his life had Bowser known what it was to be as hungry as Reddy was now, and as he had been in other winters when food was scarce.

Reddy went straight to the big barn. There was a place where he could get under it. He might catch Robber the Rat, or one of his tribe, under there. He didn't. He could hear their squeaky voices but they were where he couldn't get at them. Hearing them made him feel worse than ever. crowed. What wouldn't Reddy have given to have Chaunceler within springing distance! Finally Reddy went over to the old stone wall along the edge of the Old Orchard. He visited the doorstep of the underground house beneath the old wall where Polly Chuk was spending the winter. He knew she was down there but there was nothing he could do about it. It was hard to be so hungry and so helpless to do anything about it.

He stood looking through the trees of the Old Orchard. Sammy Jay came from the Green Forest. He stopped in a tree on the other side of the Old Orchard. He seemed to be pecking at something. Opening lead—three of spades. Some of the great plays of bridge are afterthoughts. Here is one that declarer solved right at the table, as smooth a piece of work as you'd ever want to see.

The declarer was Ben Kaplan, of Bridgeton, N.J. Kaplan probably be one of our top players if it weren't for the fact that he wastes so much time paying attention to his plumbing supply business. Years ago he was playing in a rubber bridge game where the bidding in the deal shown went as indicated. The vulnerability conditions made it clear to him that East's three spade call was based on a six card suit.

That West's lead was a singleton was also confirmed by the size of the card led, the three. The four and deuce were in sight. East won the opening lead with the ace of spades and Kaplan played the king without a quiver. He knew that if he played the deuce on the ace, a spade would be returned for West to ruff and three would then be no possibility to make the hand.

Naturally enough, East abandoned the spade suit and returned the queen of diamonds. It didn't occur to East that declarer would throw away a winner on the ace of spades in order to keep a loser, the deuce of spades.

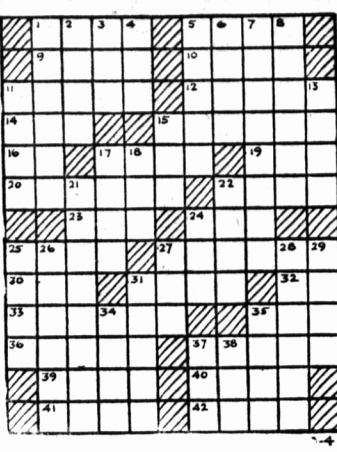
Kaplan won the diamond return with the ace, drew two rounds of trumps, and conceded the eight of spades to East's ten. Back came the jack of diamonds, taken by the king. A trump so dummy was followed by the nine of spades, which East covered with the queen, and declarer ruffed.

Another trump to dummy enabled South to discard his losing diamond on the established jack of spades to East's ten. Back ruffed and four spades was made, declarer losing two spade tricks and a club.

Had Kaplan made the normal play of the spade deuce on the ace, the automatic low spade return would have led to four losers—two spades, a diamond and a club.

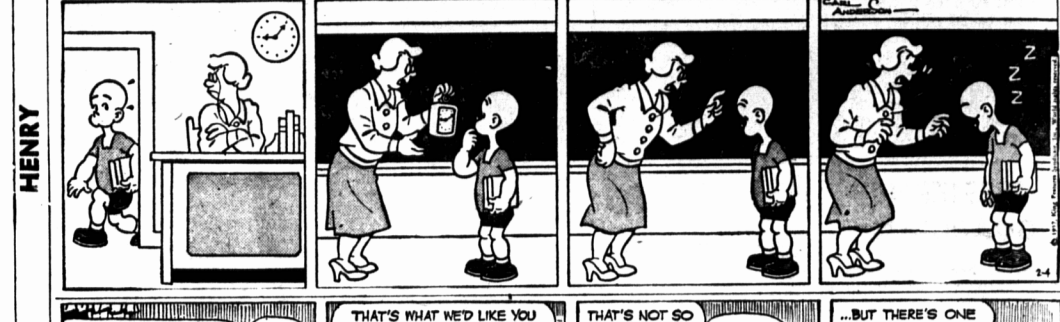
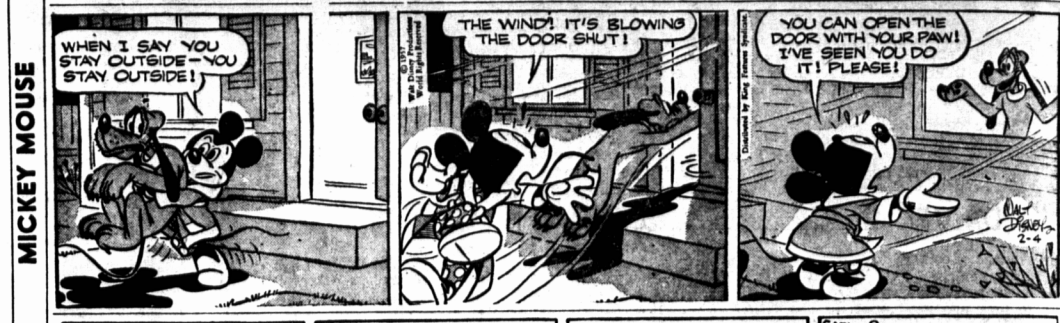
