Council Lowers Rent To Clubs

On motion of Councillor Mac Causland rental fees payable by service clubs for the rental of the Civic Auditorium were revised downward from \$75.00 to a new rate of \$35.00 at the Summerside Town Council Meeting Thursday evening.

In reporting for the rink committee he tabled a statement from the rink manager showing income from activities at the Stadium to November 10th amounted to \$1,547.00, and that in addition to this that 80 per cent of \$1,100.00 worth of advertising space at the Stadium has already been sold. Showing a determined intention to maintain order and prevent vandalism and rowdiness at the Stadium, a recommendation was made for the appointment of three special police constables for duty at the Stadium at hockey matches. Referring to occasions in which a legal opinion would be helpful or necessary to the Council, Councillor Cannon inquired about the absence of the Town Recorder from Town Council meetings, and Mayor Currie said he would look into this matter.

ROCKEY Before the meeting began a delegate from the Summerside Amateur Athletic Association consisting of James Hogan, Horace MacFarlane, Ralph Boates, and Neil MacLeod, met with the Council to seek financial assistance in hiring Lewis Hennessy to conduct the Summerside Minor hockey program this winter. After outlining what S. A. A. A. has done towards meeting part of this cost, and also the full cost of rink rental and equipment for this program, the committee was told by Mayor Currie that the request would be considered by the Council, and they would be advised of the Council's decision within a couple of days.

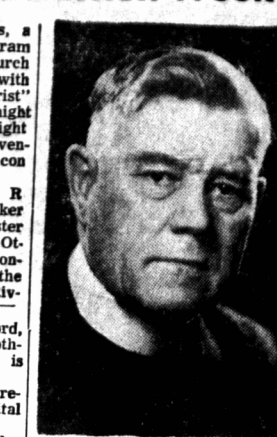
