EDUCATION.—On Thursday evening, the 23rd inst., R. B. Irving, Esq., School Visitor, lectured on this subject in the Long Creek School-house, to a large and respectable audience. Dr. Lamont, Esq., occupied the chair, and presided in his usual happy manner. Were I to attempt to give an outline of the lecture from memory, I fear I would be doing an injustice to Mr. Irving. To say that it was well done, would be but feeble praise; it was admirable. The style was perspicuous, elegant, and forcible, and the delivery, which occupied more than one hour, could not be surpassed. The lecturer spoke briefly of the progressive character of the age, and ably described the important services of the schoolmaster to society. The idea of many is, that the only individual who can be called a Schoolmaster, is the Di-trict, Parochial or Village Dominie. This is not, however, the opinion of the Lecturer, who included in the term, Ministers of Religion, College Professors, Legislators, Lawyers and Judges, Travellers and Navigators, &c., together with the mother at her fireside. The efforts of the newspaper press for the enlightenment of the people also came in for a due share of commendation. Mr. Irving made some excellent remarks on the formation of School Libraries, which should be reduced to practice by the inhabitants of P. E. Island. This part of the lecture, I understood, was expressly written to be delivered in this District. The Lecturer was, however, agreeably surprised to find that his suggestions on this head were anticipated by his audience, who established a Library in connection with their school in November last. At the close of the Lecture a discussion ensued, in which the opinion of the meeting with respect to the benefits of the Free Education Act was elicited, as testified by the following resolution, which was moved by Mr. John McEwen and seconded by Mr. J. Foley, and unanimously agreed to:— "Resolved, That it is the opinion of this meeting, that any increase of taxation for the purpose of perpetuating the present Education Act, and improving it by increasing the Teachers' salary, would be more beneficial to the people of this Colony than a return to the system in operation previous to the passing of that Act." After a vote of thanks to Mr. Irving for his interesting Lecture, the meeting closed, every one greatly delighted with the evening's proceedings.—Com.
