SUMMERSIDE BUREAU — The GUARDIAN — All councillors were present at the first general monthly meeting of the new council held last evening in the chambers, and presided over by Mayor J.E. Morrison.

Also in attendance were Town Manager J.A. Brophy, Town Engineer Gordon Jenkins, Town Clerk John E. Cameron and several interested citizens including Mr. J. Morrison, Chairman of Chamber of Commerce, Gerald Egan, Harold Noonan and W. Morrison.

The reports on the various departments were read by the town manager. In the finance department report Mr. Brophy pointed out that financial statements have been placed in the hands of each councillor, showing revenue, expenditure and balance sheets to Feb. 28.

He said the town's general statement does not reflect of the new council to establish the various revenue items for the year. He stated it behooves the council to start work on the budget, leading to striking the tax rate for the year.

Mr. Brophy told the council the 1962 assessment roll will be completed within the week to assist the council in their budgeting.
