Bruins Shade Rangers 4-3

BOSTON (AP) — Don McKenney's 29th goal of the season proved Boston with a free-wheeling 5-4 National Hockey League victory over New York Thursday night with third place at stake. McKenney also collected three assists before 11,218 Boston Garden fans.

McKenney, taking over the team scoring leadership with 57 points, gave the Bruins their first easy moment at 5:28 of the final period when he scored on a 25-foot shot.

Earl Reibel put the home forces ahead 4-3 late in the middle session. But the score had been tied three times earlier and it took McKenney's goal to assure Boston of a firmer grip on the NHL's third spot.

Boston has 65 points to New York's 62 and the triumph moved the Bruins to within two points of idle second-place Chicago.

Mackell, Jerry Toppazzini and Doug Mohs scored the other Boston goals.

The Rangers' phenomenal Andy Bathgate sparked the losers with two goals—his 39th and 30th—and an assist. Andy's fifth goal in two nights came with Rangers holding a two-man advantage. The other New York marksmen went to Bill Gadsby and Larry Popein.

Hawaii Is Voted 50th U.S. State

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hawaii, enchanting paradise of the Pacific, won statehood Thursday. Only a day behind the Senate, the House of Representatives voted overwhelmingly to make Hawaii the 50th state of the United States. The vote was 323 to 89. Voting for admission were 208 Democrats and 120 Republicans. Voting against were 65 Democrats and 24 Republicans.

Joy and jubilation spread instantly from Washington to Honolulu, by way of an open-telephone line.

The statehood bill sailed through the Senate Wednesday night, 76-15. Now it goes to President Eisenhower.

NO STOPPAGE AHEAD
There is no question of Eisenhower's signing it, or of Hawaii's accepting its terms. It has sought statehood for half a century.

But as in the case of Alaska last year, technicalities will take time. So it may be late July, possibly October, before Hawaii becomes a state. Territorial governor William F. Quinn said he is inclined toward the slower schedule but others will press for fast action.

In the sisterhood of states, Hawaii will rank 47th in size, 44th in population.

OPEN PHONE LINE
In Speaker Sam Rayburn's office, Quinn had a telephone line open to acting governor Edward Johnston in the islands.

Obstructing Charge Laid

SUMMERSIDE — Councillor Leo Wood, a member of the Summerside Town Council, yesterday afternoon was charged with obstructing Summerside police in the performance of their duty, and is scheduled to appear in police court on Monday.

The charge resulted from an incident which occurred at Civic Stadium on Tuesday night while police were escorting from the rink a Summerside man who was later convicted of being intoxicated in a public place.

Wood is alleged to have interfered with the police on two separate occasions while they were escorting individuals from the rink, and on the second occasion was himself taken into custody by the police and charged yesterday with obstructing.

Criticizing the frosted food plant did not mean he was coming out against something that might benefit the island farmer. OTTAWA DEAL

The First Queens Conservative deplored the continued exodus of people from the Province, and expressed the hope that something could be done to alleviate the situation.

From 1951 to 1956 the natural increase in the island population was 8,920, while at the same time 8,064 people departed elsewhere for a net gain of only 856, he observed.

Voters' Identity Cleared In House

It was a case of mistaken identity in naming those who voted against Dr. Dewar's motion "that the consent of the owner or lessee must be obtained before hunting or trapping can be carried out on any private property."

Morley M. Bell (L-5th Prince) yesterday on a question of privilege in the House wanted it known that it was he and not Fred Ramsay (L-1st Prince) who voted against the motion. Mr. Ramsay was just as determined that it be known that he voted for Dr. Dewar's motion.

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ADMIT GRATITUDE

"I wish the Premier would openly admit in the Legislature how grateful he is," Mr. Myers said. The Crapaud farmer rapped the manner in which the Falconwood Farm was administered. Instead of providing milk for the inmates of the institution, the Minister of Agriculture was more interested in building up a show herd, he said.

Last year he bought \$5,000 worth of new stock, said \$2,000 worth, and received only \$100 in prize money. My Myers expressed the opinion that it was very poor business to put out \$4,000-\$5,000 dollars and only get \$100 back.

Mr. Cullen's figures respecting the decline in the cattle population of the Province—110,000 in 1951 as opposed to 104,000 in 1958 must have been taken from Dodd's Almanac, Mr. Myers remarked.

the provincial debt was only \$15,554,000.

The Queens Conservative commended the Provincial Treasurer for the capable manner in which he had presented the budget but termed it a "very sad case indeed."

Despite the general criticism of the federal government on the part of the Liberal members of the House, Ottawa had been very sympathetic in its treatment of this Province, Mr. Myers asserted.

In 1957 revenue received by this Province from Ottawa totalled \$5,561,000 while total contribution from this source in 1959-60 was expected to be \$9,113,906, or 60 per cent of the revenue of the Province.
