

# Coroner Says Death Due Lack Seat Belts

SUMMERSIDE — An inquest of a coroner's jury in Summerside this night into the death of William Kenneth Montgomery, Bridgetown, N.S., handed down a verdict that "we find that William Kenneth Montgomery came to his death on Sept. 29, 1962, as a result of a collision between a car driven by the deceased and another car driven by Charles Hughson at an intersection of the Trans-Canada Highway in Central Bruceville, North Bruceville School. "We recommend that Charles Hughson be cleared from any blame and also that the intersection be more clearly marked," the jury said.

Coroner W. R. Gillis presided. Jurors were Harold Campbell, Chilton, foreman; Lorne Reeves, North Bruceville; Stan Oliver, Summerside; Harry James, Summerside; Arthur Gaudet, John MacNeil, and James Jewell, all of Central Bruceville.

The coroner also noted that it was now known what injuries were sustained by the deceased. The body was received, by being thrown from his car. Dr. Gillis said that after having heard the situation, he examined the deceased and seeing the RCMP officers of the accident scene, he noted that actually death was not a result of the collision itself but rather from being thrown from the car. He thought seat belts would have saved the deceased's life.

Witnesses called were Mrs. Lois Grace Montgomery, Bridgetown, N.S., widow of the deceased; William Roydon Montgomery, Port Hill, a brother of the deceased; Christine Montgomery, Port Hill, niece of the deceased; Charles Hughson, Sherwood, driver of the other vehicle; Hudson Jeffrey, Lower Bruceville, at whose home deceased had visited before the death; Keith Ramsay, Kensington, who was coming from the Borden area and saw the accident occur; Arnold Mason, Sherbrooke, mechanic who examined the Hughson car; Richard Rogerson, Beletown, who examined the Montgomery vehicle; Cast. Allan Burchell, Borden RCMP and Cast. Ian D'Amico, Borden RCMP, two of the investigating officers.

Dr. John Craig, pathological reporter, testified that he had no liquor was in the deceased's body and that the cause of death was due to several places and chest damage.

# Canadian Welfare Council Unites Country's Services

Editor's note: This is an article in the series of articles concerning organizations taking part in the province-wide United Fund Campaign.)

The Canadian Welfare Council is the single agency that unites all welfare services in the country. It is a bridge between public and private welfare, a centre for joint welfare and citizen participation.

Nearly all funds in Canada belong to this organization which helps them with their common concerns and gives service to their member agencies. The council is listed as special agency in the P.E.I. United Fund, with \$400 its share of the total \$27,467.

The national voluntary association for social welfare was organized in 1950 with an office number and a voluntary and part-time director.

GROWS RAPIDLY  
Since then it has grown to include 452 social agencies, government departments, church organizations, labor unions, professional organizations and 1,156 individual members.

Its main functions are leadership in planning and action for social welfare, technical consultation, public information and research. Its five divisions are family and child welfare, community funds and councils, corrections, public welfare and recreation.

The council sets up committees for special projects, has committees on aging, welfare of immigrants, personnel in social work. There is an increasing demand for council consultation service and leadership in improving social welfare services in Canada.

What welfare means and what welfare services do still a mystery to many people. Public relations work for the council is essential.

and councils is extended by provision of television "spots" on welfare for year round use and by the use of slide film for fund canvassers.

SECURITY BRIEF  
In 1960, year of its 40th anniversary, the council was undertaking such projects as a brief on social security, a program on home care, a program for the staff of social agencies, crime and child welfare statistics, studies on desecration and transients, and a plan for a national workshop on the use of recreation.

So that the council may be free and independent, financial support is derived one-third each from community funds, national business corporations and government grants.

The council is much more necessary today than ever as the country becomes more urban and industrial. To maintain its valuable contribution to Canadian social welfare, support in both money and personal participation is needed.

# Midnight To See Clocks Turn Back

At midnight tonight an experiment in time, which was spearheaded by the provincial government, comes to an end after a six-month trial period.

Earlier this year the government decided against any result legislation which would have made Daylight Saving Time the official time to be adopted during the summer months. In its place Premier Walter R. Shaw suggested that a voluntary system, which he referred to as "Advanced Summer Hours" be adopted by those business houses, and corporate bodies who wished to take advantage of getting the extra hour of evening daylight.

Following the suggestion a large percentage of the communities throughout the province enacted local legislation proclaiming Advanced Summer Hours as the time on which they and their various offices would work.

In instances many business houses, the government offices included, did not advance their clocks one hour, but instructed their employees to report for work one hour earlier and finish the day's work by a similar period.

But in most cases it was decided that less confusion would be caused if the clocks were pushed ahead an hour.
