

**PROCESSING FACTORIES FORECAST**

**Provincia Gov't Plans New Cold Storage Plant**

The provincial government intends to build a new cold storage plant, "something that is of vital necessity to our farmers, fishermen and business interests," Premier Walter S. Shaw said last night.

He was giving a televised review of activities of the provincial government during the past year. There was only a one-sentence reference to the proposed cold storage plant in his speech but it has been known for some time that the government is planning the establishment of a plant as present cold storage facilities at the government's Eber Street plant in Charlottetown are inadequate.

It was also announced by Premier Shaw that it is expected that "enterprises," similar to the Seaman Brothers (Canada) Limited plant at New Annapolis, will be established in the province in the near future. "The New Annapolis plant," he said, "will extend its scope of service and expects to be in operation for almost 12 months of the year and a study is now being made of other projects and we expect in the near future the establishment of similar enterprises."

**FORESTRY PROGRAM**

Commenting on the province's forestry program, the premier

said "our program for the next year will include the planting of new areas and the care of old areas and general supervision of forest areas that are of value to us economically."

"Training courses have been given to officials in agriculture and resources and these officials will now be able to direct farmers in proper forest conservation."

Turning to the provincial program of resource development, Premier Shaw said "tourist and recreational facilities are underway, a public rink has been completed, a fishing plant has been considered, a regatta and fisheries exhibition is underway complete recreational studies have been started, park and golf courses and a museum are being planned and vocational and educational needs are being pushed with great vigor."

"A host building and canning industry at West Point is under study. The West Point ferry proposal is receiving wide support. There is also a study under way on a marshland plant and with routing of the government has established new picnic areas, new trailer camps, scenic grounds and these are now spread all over the province. It is our intention during the coming season to expand these facilities. The whole province is more or less a national park and with routing of new centres of beauty and at-

gressive program on road construction," he said, "and we shall continue to develop our highways program with all possible speed and the utmost efficiency. Roads are vital to our development and I can assure our people that I expect to see very shortly the best road system of any Canadian province established in this province."

On regional high school construction, Premier Shaw said that "with this year's construction completed, there will be 14 regional schools in operation. These schools will provide opportunities and a training that will fit young men and women to enter the industrial life of this province and of Canada. A new vocational and technical school is also to be established at Charlottetown which will serve students from Queens and Kings Counties. This is a great step forward in the training of our people."

Stating that it was his feeling that the province will "entertain a vastly increased tourist trade," the premier said "the government has established new picnic areas, new trailer camps, scenic grounds and these are now spread all over the province. It is our intention during the coming season to expand these facilities. The whole province is more or less a national park and with routing of new centres of beauty and at-

weekends, there is almost no end to the possibilities.

"Our transportation too is under development. We now have a new boat at Borden which will give an outstanding service in keeping the traffic cleared. There is also another boat assured for the Wood Islands route and then the recent announcement of a causeway has been of tremendous importance. It is possible to foresee the great developments that will open up in this province after a causeway has been built."

In the course of his remarks, Premier Shaw paid tribute to the ministers of various departments of government. "All departments," he said, "are directed by men of outstanding ability, honesty and efficiency, men in whom I place the greatest confidence, and men in whom I feel have a full recognition of the needs of our people. I am convinced that under their present policy that public services are being carried out with the utmost efficiency."

**Possession Of 'Wash' Results In \$100 Fines**

ALBERTON — Joseph Raymond Perry and Gerard Wilson Perry, Tignish, were each fined \$100 and costs yesterday when they pleaded guilty before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonnell to possession of 90 gallons of wash suitable for the manufacture of spirits contrary to the Excise Act.
