LOST OVERBOARD.

Felix Benoit Drowned Early This Morning.

The schooner Ella May, Captain Foster, arrived from Bathurst this morning and is now discharging a cargo of shingles and shingles for Mr. M. P. Hogan and Mr. Rathbury.

About half past four this morning, just after the schr. had rounded the black buoy outside the blockhouse, Captain Foster ordered the gaff-top-sail to be clewed up, Felix Benoit, one of the crew, went to cast off the sheet, which was fast to the rack-rail in the rigging, and in some unknown way fell overboard.

A bundle of shingles was flung overboard, and the captain called to him to seize it but he failed to do so. The ship's boat was also lowered, but by the time it reached the place where Benoit fell he had passed out of sight.

Benoit was a good swimmer, but was probably dragged down by the weight of clothing. Besides heavy top boots, he wore two or three coats.

The unfortunate man was about 40 years of age, and belonged to Madame Island, near Arichat, where he leaves a wife and six or seven children to mourn his untimely end.

Pickwick or an Oyster.

To my chief benefactors, whom it was also my high privilege to know as friends, Dickens, Thackeray and Leach, I have done homage on happy occasions, and I have a pleasant recollection of the smile and the sympathy of the author of "Pickwick" when I told him, in proof of my profound admiration, how in my schoolboy days, with an income of sixpence per week, I had saved half for the monthly numbers of his famous book, still in my possession, bound in two volumes, and in the most degraded form of the art.

The smile expanded as I proceeded to describe my wrestlings with temptation, the agony of conflict, when the siren sang, in the form of an oysterman who passed at intervals by the door of our schoolyard, and lured us not only by the cravings of appetite, but by the fascinations of gambling.

His mode of business was to receive a halfpenny from his customer, who cried "head" or "tail" (the tail was represented by Britannia in full uniform uncomfortably located on the edge of her shield) as the vendor threw it upward. The customer lost his coin if his conjecture was wrong. If right, he received an excellent oyster, with a copious supply of peppered vinegar from a huge stone bottle, with a slit in the cork.—S. How Rats Multiply.

In this city rats are found in considerable numbers, the brown rats predominating on the ships and wharfs, the black rats in the stores and warehouses, and the Alexandrian rats being limited to the holds of the ships that come from southern ports. Weasels and ferrets are used to keep down their numbers. The fecundity of the rats is so great that in a few years they would overwhelm a whole city if they were not kept down by artificial means. One pair will rear four or five families of 10 to 15 to each litter in one year, and in six months these young ones are ready to reproduce. Thus one couple in the course of three years could raise a population of several hundred thousand if not restrained by any destructive measures.—New York Sun.

SCHOONER ASHORE.—We hear with regret that the schooner Alma, Captain Boudreaux, went ashore in St. Peter's canal during the late gale. The Alma was owned by captain Anderson and was loaded with slack coal for C Lyons & Co. Part of the cargo will have to be discharged before the schooner can be floated. There is no insurance on either vessel or cargo.

LIKES CANADIAN FRUIT.—The Mayor of Manchester likes Canadian fruit. Here is what he says of the samples sent him by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa: "The packages of peaches and pears were delivered to my house on Saturday morning last. The contents came to hand in splendid condition, and all I can say is that if your country can deliver fruit of this quality, and in such condition, the market in this country is an unlimited one. I have sent specimens around to friends, who pronounce the condition excellent and wonderful."

THE MOHEGAN DISASTER.—English newspapers are still guessing at the cause of the Mohegan disaster. They recall now that the Tanagers are almost as dangerous as the mythical Scylla and Charybdis. Variable magnetic conditions exist there which are apt to disturb ship's compasses, and the wreck of the Palmyra in 1885, under similar circumstances, is recalled. Several of the surviving passengers have visited London as the guest of Mr. Williams, the agent of the company, and all passengers were given £5 each before leaving Falmouth. The courtesy of the steamship company is highly commendable.

New Francis Bacon Was Rid of Warts.
