### The Dominion Exhibition.

At a recent meeting, the Executive Committee of the Dominion Exhibition reported, that an excursion train from Toronto would be run at very low rates; that Mr. Taylor, General Superintendent of the Intercolonial desired to know what outside attractions will be provided; that the Prince Edward Island Government had agreed to pay freight on all exhibits; and the New Brunswick Government refund freight on all exhibits, and to have the fact officially advertised.

We trust that the Commissioners for both the Dominion and local Exhibitions will make a point of arranging for the very lowest fares that can possibly be obtained, so that the greatest possible number may be induced to come and see the Exhibition.

### Our Trade.

The Imports and Exports of the Dominion of Canada, exclusive of British Columbia, for the twelve months ending 30th of June last, were as follows:—

Of course the imports given above are simply the imports for home consumption. For the previous fiscal year the same returns were:—imports, \$69,634,149, and exports, \$82,602,979. Which show an excess for the fiscal year just closed of \$18,702,075 in imports, and \$10,621,354 in exports. If to the above figures we add a fair estimate for British Columbia, and for exports short returned at inland ports, we will find that our total imports for home consumption for the year will amount to \$91,000,000, and our exports to \$99,000,000. The whole volume of trade including the amount of goods imported for export will, we believe, amount to over \$200,000,000, showing a most gratifying increase for the year.—Ez.

### The Luona Mine.

Private and public advices are unanimous in the statement that the Luona Mine—the mine in which Mr. J. H. Fletcher is largely interested—is fast developing into one of the best mining properties in Colorado if not in America. The Gothic Miner in a recent report says:—

"The Luona still continues to produce that high character of mineral for which she has become famous."

The following letter we clip from the correspondence columns of *The Miner*:—

"*Editor Miner*,—As there appears to be a great effort made by some unknown parties to back-cap the Luona Mine, if you choose to give me room I will give my observation of the mine. First, I will say, I have not one cent's interest, only as to the general welfare of our camp, in the Luona mine. I have been now nine years digging in the Elk mountains; have opened a number of averaged mines; have mined in other parts of Colorado since 1860; have seen nearly every good mine in the state, and now after more than a week's steady examination and prospecting the Luona property, I can say that I have never seen a mine that excels the Luona. I have traced and prospected the Luona very carefully for its whole length. I find in its 1,500 feet 27 distinct veins, running and being swallowed up by the great mother Luona vein. Many of these are good large veins and can be worked with profit. I find there is at the present workings of the Luona mine a huge body of mineral not surpassed by any one body in Colorado. There is now a cross cut run in the vein that shows nearly all the rich silver ore for over twenty feet, and the end is not yet. Its depth of course is not known, but I think within 100 feet from the present workings there is more silver bullion than in any single piece of ground of equal size in Colorado. Now we all know that all these backcapping lies either by Currihan or any others are in the interest of a few outsiders who want to steal Luona stock. We all know that Luona stock is held stiff at 60 cents, and that every spare dollar that the men have, that know anything about the mine, are putting in stock at 60 cents, and miners are glad to work on the mine and take their pay in stock at the same price, for they know that it soon will be worth double or treble what they now have to pay for it.

### A New Musical Composer.

For the last sixteen years England has been waiting for the eldest son of the Prime Minister, Mr. W. H. Gladstone, M. P. for Worcester, to make his maiden speech in the House of Commons, but his talent would seem to lie in a different direction. He has composed two new hymn tunes, one of which appears in the new "Bristol Tune Book" and the other in a tune book just issued by the Wesleyan Sunday School Union. They are pretty enough as hymn tunes, but show no musical genius. The harmony is very commonplace. In a word, Mr. Gladstone composes like a Prime Minister's son.

### A Royal Vocalist.

The "Courier's" London correspondent says: A new vocal star has appeared in an unexpected quarter. H. R. H. the Princess Maud, youngest daughter of the Prince and Princess of Wales, has, it appears, shown promise of the most extraordinary vocal power. She is only twelve years of age, but she is said already to be able to execute the most difficult solos in a manner to surprise her royal parents and sisters and every one else. Indeed music has become with her so great a passion that her parents, in deference to both medical and musical advisers, have had to place a temporary interdiction upon her devotion to her favorite study. Of course I would have you remember that what appears little in any ordinary person is something wonderful when seen in a prince or princess.

### Shooting Affair.

At North Sydney, C. B., an outrage of a serious character took place last Saturday. While the Yarmouth ship "Minnie Burrell," Robertson, master, was lying at anchor in the harbor, outside the bar, at about two p. m., one of the seamen, an Italian, was shot in the breast, it is said, by one of the officers—Captain or second mate. Two doctors were sent off who endeavored to extract the bullet, but failed. One states that they cut till they found the breast bone shattered, and that the ball penetrated beneath the breast bone or ribs. The whole affair was kept concealed from the authorities until it was too late to act. The ship was taken to sea at night by a tug, with the culprit and wounded man bound to Quebec or St. John, where it is to be hoped the guilty party will be brought to justice. The doctors declare the wound to be of a serious character, yet two Magistrates, it is asserted, were cognizant of the whole affair. The conduct of the persons implicated is generally condemned. It is said that it will be miraculous if the wounded man reaches the port of destination alive.

Both the Dominion Premier and ex-Premier have spent the summer in Great Britain in search of health. Each seems to have been in a frail condition on his arrival this spring in England, though Mr. McKenzie was farther advanced on the road to recovery than Sir John. It is pleasing to learn that they have found their lengthened visit in the old land so profitable to them. Mr. McKenzie has been able to make the tour of the Highlands of Scotland in a leisurely manner, and is returning to Canada, it is said, in perfect health. Sir John had not, at the latest advices, been so completely restored to health as had Mr. McKenzie, but was doing exceedingly well, and seemed steadily approaching the verge of complete recovery. Canadians of all shades of political thought will be heartily glad if both these eminent men return to the country of their adoption in as perfect a condition of health as could be desired.

So far as we can learn, the first self-binding reaper was landed here last week, consigned to Mr. John West, agent for such implements. The machine has not yet been set going, but we understand it to be tried in a few days on the farm of W. H. Brown, Esq., a short distance from here. As this is decidedly an advance movement in farming, many will no doubt be on the ground to witness the trial referred to. With self-binding reapers and self-cleaning threshers, manual labor on the farm is very much diminished.—Pioneer.

The barkentine *Annie*, belonging to the Hon. John Yeo, arrived here from Swansea last week with a cargo of salt, anchors, chains, etc. On deck she carried three iron masts, 85 feet long, each weighing over six tons. They are intended for Capt. Richard's new vessel building here, and are we think the first 'sticks' of that kind ever put in position in Summerside. The tonnage of the new vessel will be 600 tons. She will be rigged as a three-masted schooner.—Pioneer.

We are pleased to learn that Chas. W. Strong, Esq., of the Customs department here is recovering from his late illness.—Pioneer.

The Toronto "World" rumors that the representation of Chateaugay in the House of Commons is likely to become vacant by the retirement of Mr. Holton, and that Mr. Joseph Doutre, Q. C., will contest the seat.
