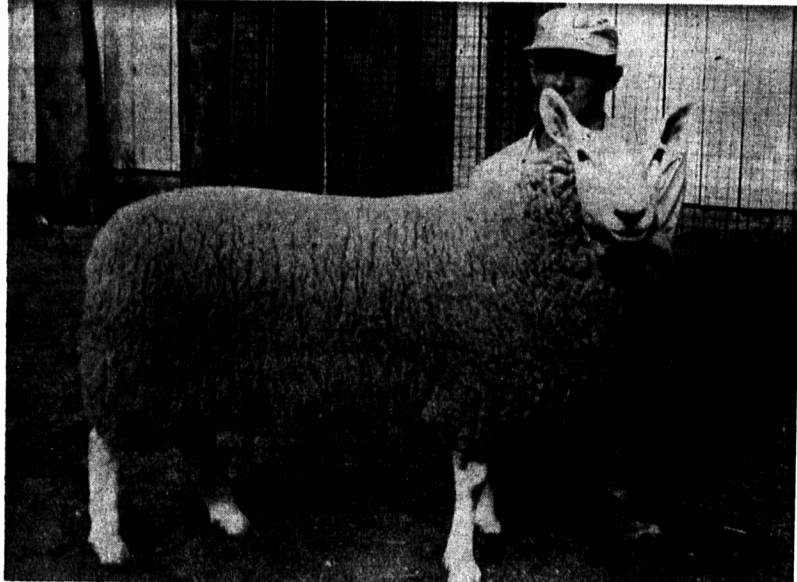


TOP YORKSHIRE SOW

Greatest Number of Exhibits For Provincial Flower Show

The 4th annual Provincial Flower Show to be held in the Baptist Hall in Summerside next Tuesday and Wednesday under the auspices of the Abegweit Chapter of the I.O.D.E. is expected to feature the greatest number of exhibits yet shown in its short history.

The show will be officially opened at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, August 23 by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture; and the special speaker will be Mr. Bramwell Chandler, Supervisor of P.E.I. Libraries and Audio-Visual Education Department.

An afternoon tea will be served from 4 to 6 p.m. by the ladies of the sponsoring organization, the Abegweit Chapter of the I.O.D.E., and in the evening the presentation of prizes to the winners in the various floral classes will be supplemented by entertainment in the form of highland dancing by Mrs. Garden Lawson whose presentation will include the popular Irish jig. On the entertainment program will also be featured a trio of Summerside girls—Misses Myrna Hancock, Maureen Forbes and Irene Mountain—who will present vocal selections first in costumes worn 100 years ago, and then in costumes of the present day.

This popular flower show continues to expand and improve from year to year, and already there are indications that this year will see the greatest number of exhibits ever shown in its history. Judges for the gladioli in the show will be Gordon C. Warren and J. Wilfred Cudmore, of Charlottetown, while the balance of the Daisy Award and Mr. and Mrs. A. Milburn of Moncton, N.B.

Suspend Strip Tease Strike

NEW DELHI (AP)—Government clerks have decided to keep their shirts on. After only one day without shoes, they have suspended a "strip strike" for higher pay and improved working conditions.

They had planned to report for work wearing less and less each day until their demands were met. The original schedule called for pajamas by Aug. 22, and after that only loincloths.

A spokesman said the campaign was called off Thursday because some members of Congress had promised to support the clerks' cause.

Girls Tote Weapons For Teen-Age Gangs

NEW YORK (AP)—Two dozen girls were reported Thursday to have acted as knife and gun toters for riva' teen-age gangs of boys in a Brooklyn street fight.

Police broke up the battle of 50 boys Wednesday night, but not before one youth had suffered a stab wound.

Police said both gangs brought along girl auxiliaries as weapon carriers operating off the theory that the police would round up the boys first, thus giving the girls a chance to escape with the weapons' evidence.

The theory worked. None of those seized was found to possess a weapon.

The girls hid zip guns, knives and clubs in their clothing and passed them to the boys as needed. They took them back when police arrived.

More Clashes In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (Reuters)—Two persons were killed and more than 100 were arrested in clashes between police and Catholic opponents of President Juan Peron's regime Wednesday it was reported here today.

Violence continued late into the night in various parts of the capital. Club-wielding police charged Catholic demonstrators near the San Martin monument in central Buenos Aires. Tear gas was also used to disperse the demonstrators. There were reports of mysterious gunfire in parts of the city.

The demonstrations coincided with the 105th anniversary of the death of Gen. Jose San Martin, the "father of Argentina."

ARREST 40

The latest violence followed disturbances earlier Wednesday when firemen turned their hoses on the struggling crowds and 40 persons were arrested.

ISOLATE DEPTH CHARGE

TORONTO (CP)—A section of Lake Ontario will be closed to shipping for six months because a depth charge failed to explode Tuesday. The depth charge was fired from HMCS Wallaceburg during naval training exercises and its captain, Cmdr. F. J. Jones marked its location and notified department of transport officials.
