Household Hints.

SCORFULA.—A tea made of ripe, dried
whortleberries, and drunk in place of water is
a sure and speedy cure for scorfula diffi-
culties, however bad.

INFLAMED EYELIDS.—Cut a slice of stale
bread as thin as possible; toast both sides
well but don't burn; when cold lay in cold
spring or ice water; put between a piece of
old linen and apply, changing when it gets
warm.

DYSPEPSIA REMEDY.—Subnitrate of bis-
muth, 2 ounces; powdered Jamaica ginger,
2 do.; do. gum arabic, 2 do.; bicarbonate of
soda, 2 do.; powdered sugar, 2 do.; mix
thoroughly, and swift. Dose a teaspoonful
in water twice a day.

TO CLEAN SILK.—Take a quarter of a
pound of soft soap, a teaspoonful of brandy
and a pint of gin; mix all well together, and
strain through a cloth. With a sponge or
flannel spread the mixture on each side of
the silk without creasing it; wash it in two
or three waters; and iron on the wrong side,
it will look as good as new, and the process
will not injure silks even of the most delicate
colours.

TO REMOVE GREASE SPOTS.—In removing
grease spots from clothing with benzole or
turpentine, the usual way is to wet the
cloth with the detergent and then rub it
with the sponge or the like. This only
spreads the grease, and does not remove it.
The proper method is to place soft blotting
paper beneath and on the top of the grease
spot, after the latter has been thoroughly
saturated with the benzole; then press well.
The fat is thus dissolved and absorbed by
the paper, and entirely removed from the
clothing.
