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PM Discusses Free Trade With U.S. And Caribbean

MONTREAL (CP)—Canada cannot seriously contemplate a free trade union with the United States and the Caribbean countries unless it is assured it would not lose its political independence, Prime Minister Pearson said here.

He also said Canada, living in an interdependent world, must strengthen the things of the mind, heart and spirit to retain its identity as a nation.

Addressing the Quebec wing of the Liberal Federation of Canada, Mr. Pearson scoured the opposition in Parliament—the Conservatives for breaches of political ethics and the New Democrats for advocating policies that would bankrupt the country.

Notes for the address were released in advance of delivery. The Liberals, he said, always have advocated realistic freedom of trade, but all barriers cannot be removed overnight.

"Canada could not seriously contemplate a free trade union with the United States and the Caribbean countries unless the Canadian economy were strong enough and Canadian ownership and control of all our sources of prosperity complete enough to ensure that we could not lose our political independence."

Concern about foreign ownership in Canada does not represent a desire to "live in lonely isolation behind some Canadian curtain of snow," but reflects a desire to have a national identity.

He said that "not a few" of the government's difficulties result from "certain of our opponents, furnished for lost power," who are "willing to sacrifice every scrap of political ethics and to throw aside all respect for facts and all responsibility in their factious opposition."

OPERATION WAS SMOOTH

Mr. Pogson says all went smoothly because members of the joint committee were strong, independent men who realized that the subject was too important to be left to the usual pressures.

As a result, there was no wasted time in personality conflicts or the flouting of pet theories.

Mr. Pogson says participation was the keynote—"the concern was doing things with people, not to them."

A feeling of security was maintained within the group by an overriding interest in the well-being and welfare of the workers.

No one came to meetings with his mind made up. All written and spoken communication was kept as clear as possible, personal opinions were respected and semantics were avoided at all times.

The citizenship and immigration department provided grants under the manpower mobility program to relocate displaced employees and the National Employment Service agreed to immediately interview and register men to be displaced.

The provincial education department provided concrete information to employees on available training programs and the citizenship department made training allowances for displaced employees regardless of availability of new jobs.

Special leave was granted to displaced employees to look for new jobs. Training programs were established for employees reassigned to new jobs.

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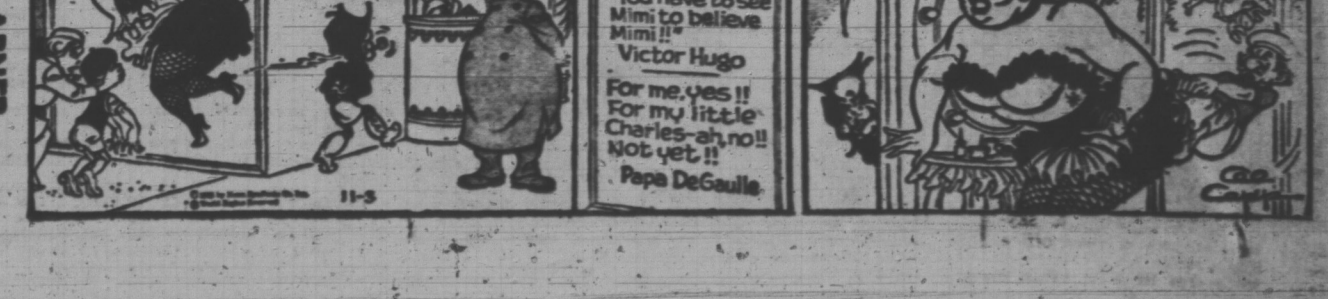
