## NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.

Typhoid fever is making its ravages felt here. In St. Jean Baptiste village the drainage is in a terrible condition and typhoid fever is on the increase, while singular to relate, small-pox has nearly disappeared. The water in the St. Lawrence is unusually low.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.

It is said Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise will be a passenger out on the "Sarmatian" next trip, in which event Capt. Aird is to be knighted.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.

A despatch to a military gentleman in this city, received this morning, contains most alarming news from Europe. Among other things that the Dardanelles are being armed with consent of Russia, and that England has instructed Lord Dufferin, her ambassador at St. Petersburg, to hold no further official communication with the Russian Government.

LONDON, Ont., Nov. 17.

Two youths, sons of wealthy and influential parents, absconded for the purpose of seeking their fortunes, but were overtaken at Clifton and brought back. They had stolen between them about \$180, with which, and extra clothing and revolvers, they intended to buy a ship and become pirates. They had bought no less than nine revolvers; \$100 of the stolen money was found on them and returned to the owners. The boys are aged about twelve years, and imbibed their ideas of life from the pernicious novels of the period.

UNITED STATES.

LANCASTER, Ohio, Nov. 17.

John Graff, a German farmer was attacked on the road on Saturday night, robbed and fatally beaten. Before dying, he named Jack Ranch as one assailant. He, with five others, were arrested.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.

In a quarrel yesterday Wm. Dermott, in Brooklyn, struck his wife on the head with an iron kettle. The injuries will probably prove fatal. Dermott was arrested.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 17.

The final splice in the new French cable was made at 11.30 this morning and communication was had with Brest, when congratulatory messages were exchanged. The Faraday has had remarkably good fortune with the new cable, never losing a moment in her successful trip from the moment she started with it until now, when she has completed the last.

NEW YORK, Sept. 17.

Max Berger, lottery dealer, under the name of Hocksman & Co., has brought a suit against Postmaster James in the Supreme Court of the State of New York, for alleged illegal detention of his letters, for which he claims \$2,500 damages. The case will probably be transferred to the Federal Court. The letters were detained under orders from the Postmaster General, based on the law authorizing him to detain letters concerning lotteries, etc.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

A Cabinet Council was called to-day by telegraph at very short notice. It sat over an hour. All the ministers were present except Viscount Sandon and the Duke of Richmond.

The statement that Lord Dufferin had expressed some opinions as to the statute of England and Russia with regard to Turkey, is now denied.

YARMOUTH, Nov. 17.

Ship "Royal Charter," from Philadelphia for Antwerp with a cargo of grain, is reported fallen in with at sea, abandoned. She was a fine ship of 1304 tons, owned by Nathaniel Churchill and others, of Yarmouth, and was insured in Yarmouth offices to the extent of \$20,000.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

A despatch from Hendage says that the Government has telegraphed to the captains general throughout Spain to hold in readiness, to start before the end of the year, those portions of the troops destined to reinforce Cuba.

CABUL, Nov. 17.

Forty-nine Afghans were hanged for complicity in the massacre of the British Embassy.

It is reported that trouble is apprehended in the Ghuzni country.

One of the Khans and his brother are inciting an insurrection in Kohistan.

CALCUTTA, Nov. 17.

The Rumpa rebellion appears to be reviving. The ringleader has recovered from his illness and is committing fresh outrages. Fever prevails among the troops and police.

CUBA.

HAVANA, Nov. 17.

The Mayor of Remedios has issued an order, in consequence of disturbances there on the 9th, when the railroad warehouses were robbed, that all establishments must close at ten o'clock with the exception of hotels, coffee houses and apothecaries shops which are to close at eleven. From dark until daylight no one is permitted to leave town, and all meetings composed of more than four persons are prohibited.

Carillo, the principal leader of the Insur-

cents in Remedios, was attacked on the Wilson farm, whence he fled to the woods.

The Mayor of Calbarien has telegraphed to the authorities that the Insurgent Chiefs Alfredo Perese, Pastor Carrillo and Juan Casanova, have surrendered. Great indignation is felt at the conduct of some of the ex-chiefs, who, after receiving employment and benefits from the Government, have betrayed their confidence and returned to disturb the country by raising an insurrection.

The Government has declared Villa Clara in a state of siege.

A Local Captain in the American Vice-Admiralty Court.

At the Vice-Admiralty Court, His Lordship Sir William Young, delivered an important judgment in the cause of "Jean Anderson" for wages decreasing in favor of the master for the sum of 432.71 dollars with costs of the suit. The cause was heard before him on the 20th ult., and involves some points not previously raised. He decides that the right to proceed in this Court against a ship for wages and disbursements is not taken away by the Dominion Insolvent Acts; and that, although the right of possession and title to the ship passed to the assignee under the writ of attachment and insolvency, yet the insolvency of the owners *ipso facto* did not determine the authority and functions of the master, or operate as a dismissal to him. Mr. H. H. Bligh appeared for the claimant, Captain John Williams, of New Road, Llanely, and Mr. J. N. Ritchie, Q.C., for the respondent, assignee.—N. Y. Herald.

BANKRUPT OWNER AND MASTER'S WAGES. Editor Shipping and Mercantile Gazette.

SIR,—I purchased a vessel, belonging to Charlottetown, P. E. I., through the Agent in England, and signed the agreement 21st of August last, and signed the duplicate on the 28th of the same month, in presence of one of the owners, to whom I was introduced by the Agent as Capt. Williams who had bought the "Jean Anderson," and that I was going out to Prince Edward Island after the vessel, which was then on her way out to Charlottetown, and to take charge of her for the return voyage to England, at a wage of 10l per month until the cargo was discharged, when my wages were to cease. There was a condition that I was to come to Prince Edward Island and take charge of the vessel as Master, but first to bring her to Pictou to undergo repair which was to be done to my satisfaction, according to the agreement which I signed. The vessel was got ready for sea, when the firm became bankrupt, and the vessel was seized by the creditors. I took charge as Master on the 10th September, and the vessel was seized 10th of October. I received orders from the assignee on December 7th to make up the accounts of wages of the crew and myself, and to be at the Shipping-office at 2 p. m. and get the crew discharged. I asked the assignee if I was going to be paid off also. He said that he did not know just then, until he had orders from the official assignee from Charlottetown, and told me to live on shore, that he would pay for my board, which I agreed to do; but in half-an-hour after he came to me at the vessel and said that he had countermanded his order, saying that I was not the Master of the "Jean Anderson" because my name was not on the register, which I did not think requisite or customary until the vessel was cleared and ready for sea, and, of course, the former Captain's name, who brought the vessel from England to Prince Edward Island, was upon the register. The other Captain was removed to another vessel which was at another port. When he was proceeding to sea with the other vessel she struck on the bar and commenced to make water, and he made his way for Pictou in distress. Next day, after he had arrived in Pictou, his vessel was also arrested by the creditors. After he had laid at Pictou for some time his crew were also paid off, but he (the Captain) was kept on and got his wages and board paid by the assignee, who refuses me wages or any board since my crew have been discharged. He acknowledged me as Master until my crew were discharged, which was done by me; and he paid my board from the 7th to the 19th of December last, and he refuses to pay me any wages or board since that time. I am here destitute and penniless since 19th December last. What am I to do to recover my wages and board, and also the advances I made to the crew, which were paid according to my accounts?

[As the assets of the insolvent are in the possession of the assignees of the bankrupt, there is no other resource than to obtain an order from the Vice-Admiralty Court for the wages due, and present the same to the assignee as proof of claim if disputed.]

THE CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY.—It is said that there are now employed on section A, Canada Pacific Railway, 1,200 men, and on section B, 1,000 men. The work of excavating is being rapidly proceeded with, and will be continued during the winter months. It is expected that both contracts will be completed before the stipulated time. On the Manitoba section, Mr. John Ryan has a small force of men getting out ties and otherwise preparing the way for active operations.
