

# Parkdale Basts Caps 8-1 To Take 2-0 Series Lead

Parkdale's powerful Flyers fired three unanswered goals in the first period last night at the Sports Arena and went on from there to methodically smother Fredericton Capitals 8-1 and thereby take a 2-0 lead in the best-of-five series for the right to advance against the winner of the North Shore league for the N.B.-P.E.I. senior crown.

As usual it was three Carvers—named in order of age, Lloyd Allison, Richard Keith and Donald Orin, who completely shattered Tim Bliss' faith in humanity. "They ain't human," one fan was heard to say leaving the arena, and he was probably right for the Carvers rolled in 6 of the Parkdale goals to bring their total to 11 for the two games here, to cream the cream of the Southern New Brunswick League, by good.

Last night young Orin drove home two in the first and another in the third for the hat trick and also set up 11 of the 12 goals. Coach Allie contributed two goals to the cause and also 2 helpers while Skip drove in one goal and helped himself to 3 assists.

**DEFENCEMEN** Kip Ready stood out on the blue line for Flyers, and fired a single through the defence. Jim MacLeod got into the act with a single also. Willie Dunn played a terrific two-way game for the Flyers and set up both Ready and MacLeod.

The Capitals lone goal was driven home by Bud Stewart while the Sewell brothers getting assists. Despite the terrific scoring of the Carvers and the solid defensive work of the Parkdale blue line brigade, it was a young red head named Frank Roper that stole the show. Roper was in a lacrosse mood and time after time picked goals out of the air with his educated hands.

The Capitals came out in the first period looking for goals and more goals but couldn't beat a Roper even though they had 12 shots his way. After scoring on a close-in play on which Frank had no chance whatever, they slapped 17 more drives at him in the second but couldn't beat him again. In the third he handled 39 flawlessly for 38 saves out of 39 shots.

Alan MacLeod and Dick Yeoman went off together at 11:54 of the first period for roughing to pick up the first penalties in

nearly 72 minutes of playoff hockey. That was an indication that things were not to be so smooth for referees Goodwin and Miles and in the second period they had to pass around three major penalties and break up 2 fights. Ralph Josey and Tim Bliss were the contestants in a preliminary bout with Josey getting the decision and five minutes to boot. Bliss got a minor. About five minutes after Josey and Bliss came back the main event went on with Orin Carver and big Bruce Watts battling it out. Both picked up majors.

In this second period the Flyers had Orin Carver and Josey in the box at the same time and Caps were minus Bliss. Despite the man advantage for 3 minutes and 49 seconds Caps got only one clean drive at Roper, such was the defense thrown up by Allie Carver, Ready, Wood and Junior MacLeod.

**BIGGEST CROWD**  
The biggest crowd of the entire season—in the near vicinity of 2,000—cheered the Flyers on their second straight victory. However, they were a little disappointed with the comparative ease with which the Flyers scored their goals. Capitals were expected to put up a much tougher fight in the second game. One more win and the Flyers go into the N.B.-P.E.I. finals. The series resumes Monday at Fredericton.

The opening goal of the tussle came after a face-off in deep Fredericton territory. Allie Carver fired a shot from the point and Orin was stung right there to flip the rebound home. Allie Carver made it 2-0 at 9:58 slapping in Skip's passout from the corner and at 15:55 Orin made good on a solo dash when he broke up a Fredericton play at center and charged through the defence. He skated right in on MacTavish and the Caps' steady goalie didn't stand a chance.

Bud Stewart got the Caps back into the game when he deflected Doug Sewell's pass into the open corner of the net and Fredericton really turned on MacTavish and the Caps couldn't get anything more beyond the Parkdale crease. The Caps were buzzing around the Parkdale net when the puck came flying out to center ice. Allie

Carver and Yeoman raced after the puck but the Parkdale coach got there first and sailed in all alone to give Flyers a 4-1 bulge. A minute later the Flyers took the stuffing right out of the Capitals as Skip got the fifth Parkdale goal battering in Orin's pass-out.

No penalties were called in the third as the teams more or less went through the motions. The Flyers picked up three more tallies in this period. Kip Ready made it 6-1 on a pretty passing play with Willie Dunn at 4:13. Jim MacLeod deflected Dunn's pass by MacTavish from a tough angle at 10:29 and in the last minute of play Orin Carver showed why he is one of the Maritime's finest hockey players by scoring on a back hand shot with Fredericton defenseman Guy Dunbar trying to hold him back with a hammer-lock.

**CHATTER . . .** The Caps have a nice hockey team but they can neither skate as well nor as fast as the Flyers nor can they pass as well. . . . Their passing seems to be fine in the center ice zone but once over the Parkdale line they get sloppy. . . . One victory on Fredericton ice is all the Flyers are asking for. . . . Caps will undoubtedly be a lot tougher at home, but we don't think they will be so tough that the Flyers can't win one in three. . . . The Parkdale defence was its best. . . . Kip Ready and Junior MacLeod really stood out. . . . The Capitals flew in Ray Bennett for the game but Bennett didn't help them win it. . . . Skip Carver is making the trip after all. . . . ## HUNTERS' CORNER Wildgeese Back Again

The wildgeese are with us once again and one has the feeling that spring is really in the air. Around midnight last Saturday and in the early hours of Sunday, some of our wildgeese awakened country and city folk alike as they began their annual spring trek from southern wintering grounds. Farmers at Orwell stirred in their beds in the wee small hours as they heard the wild, spine tingling music of Canada geese on the move. Flock after flock stream moved in a steady stream and when morning dawned, the river ice was black with geese. Over 300 were estimated to be in one concentration of McKennas' Point.

They sat or stood on the ice until noon and then began to move out. All day Sunday there were flocks of geese awing continually. Up until Thursday of this week they had not come back and the whereabouts of the moment is cloaked in mystery. There is no open water except at the mouth of creeks, and securing food from the fields and there was little bare ground on Sunday. Some geese are loath to retrace their flight once the northward migration to their breeding grounds has commenced. They'll carry a d feed until mid April or the twenty when the water is open and they begin filtering northward to the breeding grounds.

**THE OLD DAYS**  
In the days when spring shooting was legal hunters from Charlottetown generally planned on being set out at Tracadie Bay on March 17th. St. Patrick's day, when the geese were successful, was a big goose raffle took place at the Club later. The late Dr. Alley told me about some of his shoots when the channel off The Black Bush was clogged with ice cakes and the water was so cold that he couldn't get a dog. He had a dog who was as keen after geese as he was himself. One afternoon he felt sure he had lost him. The tide was moving swiftly seaward and a goose he fired at dropped clean a good hundred yards down channel.

His faithful dog reached the goose but couldn't manage to regain the ice at channel edge and the current was carrying him farther away all the time. Finally he managed to push the goose on the ice at a point where it wasn't so cold. Once he knew the goose was safely accounted for he kept trying until he got out himself. Half frozen though he was he carried the goose several hundred yards to his waiting master. He always looked for his reward after a job well done. I wonder who can guess what the reward was: wrapped in a blanket and given a shot of Black Diamond rum. . . . nest. On this occasion he received a double dose of rum called off. The Doctor wouldn't risk shooting any more geese under such conditions.

## PLENTY GEES

During my patrols in the early thirties to Tracadie with Prince and saddle I have counted 700 geese there on March 5th and 17th of the month. I estimated 17,000 or 18,000 geese in the Bay. They lined the channel on either side in a black window for two miles from the Black Bush to McGillivray's and southward toward McKinnon's. The open channel was packed with geese. Although I couldn't see them swimming through field glasses, I watched a forest of ponderous black wings flapping, I strayed in the area for a week on this occasion until the ice began to break up.

In the days before spring shooting of geese and brant was prohibited, the spring flight of geese was looked upon as a harvest. The birds were shot wholesale, packed in ice and shipped by the

## Cause Of Brain Damage In Moose Not Yet Determined

HALIFAX (CP)—Officials of the department of lands and forests here say they have discovered part of the answer to the "die-off" of moose in Nova Scotia in the last 20 years. They say the moose sickness is due to damage to the brain.

But, despite constant research, the experts have been unable to detect the cause of the brain damage.  
D. A. Benson, provincial wildlife biologist, has made an extensive study of the problem since moose went on the year-round rot in 1937. At present he sees a ray of hope that the moose herd may be again on the increase in the woodlands of the province, but says the "die-off" problem is far from licked.

He says there is practically no evidence to support the idea that hunting had anything to do with the decrease in moose population. Ten years after the closed season went into operation there was nothing to indicate that the herd was growing.  
For study purposes more than 30 cases of moose sickness were classified in the period 1940-1955. Detailed records of 47 animals were prepared, including fresh body material from 28 animals.

Mr. Benson says it is easy to spot the symptoms of sick moose. They lose most of their fear of humans and settle down in small areas, often near farms. If chased they almost always circle and come back to their starting place.  
When first found a sick moose may be in fairly good condition, active and capable of running. Ten days to two weeks later the animal may have died. However, the study has records of animals that recovered.

In 15 cases examined it showed a physical breakdown in brain tissues. Many of the brain linings were congested with blood and the vessels on the surface were enlarged and too full of blood. Brain tissue once hardened will not heal as muscle tissue will.  
Finally, no disease or virus was found which could be considered to be a cause of sickness.
