They could do nothing for him. Then he was advised to visit Madrid and consult the famous oculist, Don Manuel de Eschobedo.

This expert, though he had gained a wide reputation as a specialist in eye diseases, was puzzled with this case, which was not capable of pathological solution upon the basis of his past experience. He knew that the effect of coffee was of a decidedly stimulating nature, and to a great extent tonic, but the excessive use of it would severely affect the nervous system and bring about conjunctivitis and keratitis, but in the practice of the various specialists in nervous diseases no other effect of coffee was to be found except in some very rare cases, and these were manifestly curable.
