SOME anxiety is manifested in London for the safety of several vessels overdue. Amongst them the *Scandinavian*, the announcement of whose arrival at Halifax, N. S., should have reached here a week ago.

PRINCE LEOPOLD, Queen Victoria's youngest son, is, it is stated, about to travel, and there is a probability of his coming to America. He will travel modestly, having only two persons for his suite.

REV. JOSEPH HART, ex President of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Methodist Conference, and pastor of Centenary Church, St. John, N. B., died on Friday last, the 19th inst., in the 46th year of his age. His remains were interred in Halifax yesterday (Sunday.)

The grain and fat cattle show takes place to-morrow (Tuesday) at Market Hall and Square. We learn that some very superior samples of grain will be exhibited, and also that the show of fat cattle promises to excel any previous exhibition of the kind held at Charlottetown.

ANOTHER Waterloo veteran has died in Baltimore. Several thousand of the six hundred who blundered at Balaklava have gone to their eternal resting place, and not a single body-servant of George Washington has shown up for the last two years. The race is playing out.

QUEEN VICTORIA, *ditto*, does not go to Germany in May to weep over the Princess Alice's grave, but to find the Princess Beatrice a husband, or as the Court organ puts it, "the future happiness of the Princess Beatrice will form one of the motives of her royal mother undertaking the fatigues of the journey."

KILLED AT SEA.—While on passage from Bordeaux to Cadiz, on the 7th of February last, in the brigantine *Joseph*, owned by Messrs. Welsh & Owen, of this city, Angus McLean, seaman, of Point Prim, fell from the topsail yard to the deck, fracturing his skull. He died from the effects of the injury an hour afterwards.

The "Family Physician" says that there is no more valuable indication of disease than the temperature of the body as measured by the thermometer, and especially in the case of children. It gives early information of disease, and admits of an infected child being set apart before mischief is done. The "Physician" consequently advises mothers to learn how to use a clinical thermometer—a very simple process. The proper temperature of the body is 98.4° Fahrenheit.

The barque "William Owen," owned by Welsh & Owen, of this city, which sailed from Rouen, France, for Worthington, England, on the 25th of January last, has not since been heard of. The passage between Rouen and Worthington is generally made in three days. She is now nearly two months overdue, and it is supposed she foundered in some of the heavy gales which prevailed around the English coast towards the end of January. The "William Owen" was commanded by Captain Brown of this city. Her crew, with the exception of the second mate, named Shaw—who belonged to the Island—were foreigners.

A very interesting meeting of the Educational Association was held in Mr. Gaul's Schoolroom, Queen Square School, on Saturday evening. After the adoption of a Constitution and By-laws for the regulation of the Association, the subject for the evening (Corporal Punishment in Schools) was taken up. Dr. Leaming, in opening the subject, referred to the fact that public opinion was almost universally opposed to corporal punishment, but was himself of opinion that a judicious use of the rod was desirable. In former times such punishment had been carried to excess, but, at the present time, the tendency was to run to the other extreme. While he would not advise the indiscriminate use of the cane, still, in cases of immorality or persevering insubordination, thought it would have a salutary effect. Professor Anderson thought the use of the rod in schools was unnecessary; that if the teacher was a man of firmness, the scholars would soon discover that they had a master; advised the formation of separate classes for those pupils who had proved themselves incorrigible. Hon. A. A. McDonald considered that corporal punishment could not be absolutely dispensed with. Still, he thought that the cases when it would be required were rare, and that other modes of punishment should be resorted to in the majority of cases; such as depriving the pupil of the time allotted to recreation during the school session, or the imposing of tasks. D. Cameron, M. P. P., Hon. A. B. McKenzie and Mr. P. R. Bowers also spoke briefly. It was decided that the same subject be discussed at the next meeting, and that it be opened by Prof. Anderson.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, March 21.
The House will adjourn from Wednesday next until Tuesday of the following week. J. G. Baker & Co., have got the contract for supplying provisions and forage for the Northwest Mounted Police.

Major McPherson, of the Governor-General's foot-guards, has been offered the position of second officer in command of the Wimbledon Team.

The next session of the Dominion-Temperance Alliance will be held here in the Month of April.

It is expected the Supreme Court will have given decision as to the constitutionality of the Canadian Temperance Act by that time.

Banking deputation had an interview with Sir S. L. Tilley yesterday, and discussed the Government policy.

The Bankers are in accord with the Government so far as the Government policy has been made known to them.

J. W. Chipman, of Lunenburg, left last night for British Columbia to take charge, as Civil Engineer, of one of the divisions of the Canada Pacific Railway.

There is no truth in the rumors afloat about the crisis in the affairs of the Quebec Government. They were based upon a telegram, the falsity of which was proved by subsequent telegrams.

The *Gazette* contains nothing of importance except that Capt. Edward O'Brien, of Halifax, is appointed Harbor Master of that port.

There was a rumor around town to-day that Sir John Macdonald fainted in Church and was carried out, but there is no truth in it.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES.

A report has reached Cabal that troops from Herat are marching on Ghuznee.

The English election campaign increases in activity.

It has been almost impossible the past week to get a sufficient number of members of Parliament together to make a House. All important measures that could be disposed of this session were pushed through, and the Commons will meet on Wednesday only for formal prorogation preliminary to dissolution.

The Liberals seem to be active and confident.

Gladstone's speeches occupy more space in the newspapers than those of all the other candidates together.

Wm. Beckwith, the English champion swimmer, starts for America the 1st of April.

Joseph Cowen, Home Rule Member of Parliament for Newcastle-on-Tyne, received severe internal injuries by being crushed by a crowd as he was entering the hall on Friday night to address his constituents.

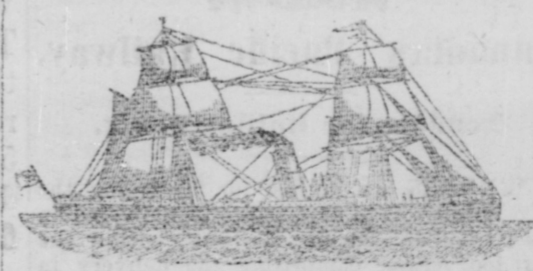
