

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 30

A cattle and freight train was wrecked on the Pennsylvania railroad near Bristol last evening. One man was injured. The road is completely blocked.

It is stated that several cars of cattle jumped the track and were run into about the same time by a freight train approaching on the opposite track. About twenty cars were wrecked and a number of cattle killed.

GLOUCESTER, Nov. 30.

The schooner Wachusset, from a Bank habbiting trip, reports the loss of one of her crew, Hector McKinnon, by the capsizing of a dory while visiting trawls. McKinnon was about thirty five years of age, a widower and a native of the Province.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.

Several capitalists held a meeting last evening to organize a postal telegraph company. It was resolved to build and equip a line to Chicago at once. The company own a patent for making compound steel and copper wire, claimed to have great conductivity, and it will use autographic automatic duplex instruments capable of transmitting 1,000 words per minute both ways. A million dollars were subscribed last evening to build the Chicago line.

EUROPEAN.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 30.

It appears that the assassin Sampowski asked first for General Ignatieff at the Bureau of Ministry, and not finding him attempted to kill his adjutant, Tchervine, instead. Another secret printing office was discovered, with proclamations in which the authors ask the pardon of the nation for what they were about to do, as it was for the benefit of all. They announce that they must make a supreme effort. This they say will be the finishing stroke. Gen. Ignatieff has tendered his resignation to the Emperor.

LONDON, Nov. 30.

The Times' Dublin despatch says the suspects in Kilmalham jail are still living on provisions supplied by the Land League.

THE PANAMA CANAL.

PARIS, Nov. 30.

At the last meeting of the Consultative Commission, convened by DeLesseps, to consider a series of questions prior to the main works at Panama being undertaken, the replies of the commission all favored the plan of the company engineer, M. Reclus, who returns to Panama on the 6th December, and commences work immediately. The isthmus will be attacked at three points simultaneously.

WHAT IS PEAT.—An immense stratum of peat underlies the city of Boston. Everybody ought to know what peat is, but some don't know. It is a spongy mass of vegetable matter, the outgrowth of swampy soils, and is composed of decayed twigs, leaves and stems of plants, the forms of which are completely preserved, and sometimes lost in the spongy substance produced in their composition. It originates in places naturally moist, where an abundance of vegetation flourishes and decays, and where the new growth above leaves the lower portion dead and buried. In time encroaching upon some former pond-bed it usurps the domain of the water, and accumulates to a depth of from twelve to forty feet. Workmen came across two peat beds the other day while making a sewer in Boston.

Elaborate preparations are being made by the British Government for the observation of the transit of Venus on December 6, 1882. Mr. Carmichael, of Toronto, Superintendent of the Meteorological Survey of Canada, has been appointed by the Dominion Government to conduct the observations in Canada. The means at his disposal for doing so are unfortunately very limited, Toronto University possessing next to nothing in the way of astronomical appliances. A proper telescope might easily be supplied at an expense of \$2,500. Toronto will furnish as good an opportunity of observing the transit, weather permitting as almost any point in the world.

THE TIME TO PAINT.—After the ground is fairly closed up by the frost for the winter, it will be an excellent time to paint the house, barn and other farm buildings, and all the farm implements and carriages that need it. Paint, spread at this season of the year, makes a durable covering, and there are no flies or other insects to spoil its looks after being spread, as during the hot days of summer. If the carriages and farm implements can be stored in a clean apartment, free from wind and dust, painting may go on uninterruptedly by doing outside work in fair weather and the carriage work during rainy days.

A favorite style of putting up butter in California is to make it in two-pound rolls and rap in thin muslin. In shipping East, a new, stout oak barrel, iron-bound, is taken, and a large canvas bag made to fit the inside; then the rolls, covered with thin muslin wrappers, are packed in upright layers, the head put in place, and the barrel filled with brine until the rolls are entirely surrounded with the pickle. Butter thus treated will make the journey to New York without deterioration in flavor.

It is evident they have some snow in Winnipeg. The Times of the 20th says:—"The recent snow storm has seriously blocked the sidewalks in many places, rendering the streets impassable. The police have received instructions to enforce the snow-by-law, and those who may, perhaps, be either lazy or negligent in this matter, had better take this timely hint, as the penalty would more than pay for cleaning the sidewalk."

The quantity of cotton goods manufactured in the United States this year is larger than ever before. The northern cotton mills have increased their consumption from 291,914 bales last year to 344,489 this year, an advance of 15 per cent.; but the greatest increase was in the South, where 45,000 bales were used this year to 35,000 last year.

TERMS OF UNION.

SECTION 7.—That the Dominion Government shall assume and defray all the charges for the following services, viz:

SUB-SECTION J.—Efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the mainland of the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Inter-colonial Railway, and the Railway system of the Dominion.

As heretofore, THE EXAMINER will, in 1882, advocate the introduction of improvements calculated to advance the interests of Prince Edward Island, in particular, and the great Dominion of which we form a part, in general.

THE EXAMINER is in favor of cutting down the Local Legislature, consolidating the Local Civil Service on a sound business basis, maintaining a system of rigid economy in the administration of local affairs, and applying the money thus saved to the advancement of the Agricultural and Industrial interests of the Province.

THE EXAMINER'S policy shall be, as it has been, first National and then Political; first for the Island, next for Canada, and then for the Party by which both are governed.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an

Election for One Person to Serve as Common Councilman in the City Council for Ward Number Five of said City, in place of HENRY B. SMITH, Esquire, resigned, will be held on

MONDAY,

the Fifth Day of December, A. D. 1881, at the place following, that is to say:

In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Great George and Easton Streets.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARD. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

Nomination of Mayor and Councillors. Act 43 Victoria: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and addition of such persons together with the office and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination by such candidate."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose. Qualification of Electors. See Act 43, cap. 15, sec. 20 and 64.
