Had Cook survived his last voyage to the Pacific he might have ended the Lord only knows where! For in spite of his social handicaps, Cook rose to the pinnacle of fame at a time in the history of England when a common mortal could be hanged for killing a fox on a rich man's estate and when most poor boys had about as much chance of forging ahead in the world as the proverbial snowball has of lasting in hades. The fascinating story of this man, one of the greatest navigators of all time, may be read in the story of the Pacific by H. W. VanLoon.

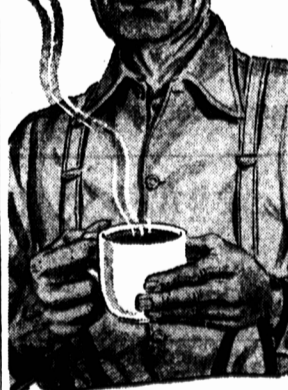

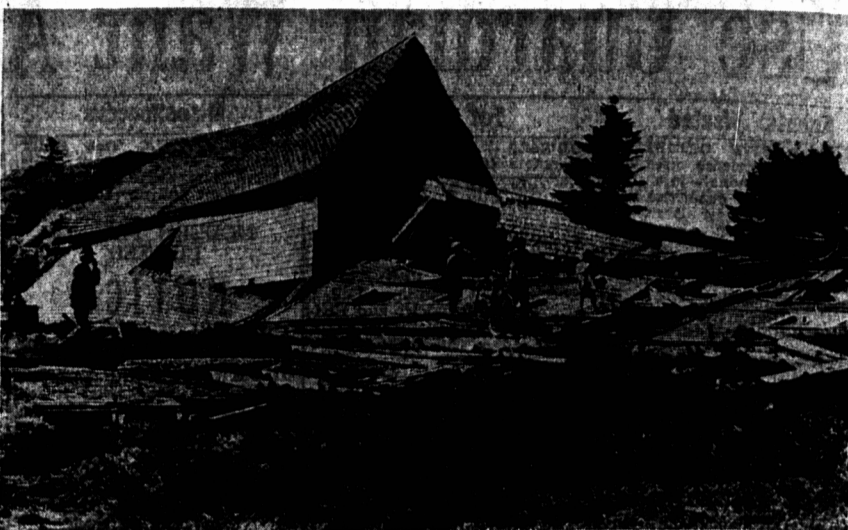
