**Heavy Docket In Magistrate's Court**

Figures by categories show: Residential \$967,029,200, down \$47,923,100; business \$660,828,300, up \$32,918,800 industrial \$382,663,829,400, up \$374,924,000, 823,400, up \$1,775,900, engineering 000, up \$61,775,900, engineering 000.

By regions the figures are: Atlantic \$138,756,900, down \$26,508,900; Quebec \$854,694,400, up \$177,266,100; Ontario \$1,203,710,100, up \$156,911,800; Western \$756,988,500, up \$14,026,600.

## Malpeque Oysters Will Delight Demerara Gourmets

HALIFAX.—When the Canadian Constructor, modern, 7000-ton motorship of the Canadian National Steamship fleet, sailed from this port Wednesday for the long run to the Caribbean, her holds were chock-full of Canadian cargo, much of it from the farms and seaports of the Atlantic provinces.

Perhaps rarest of all the fascinating miscellany of goods are choice Malpeque oysters from Prince Edward Island, carefully packed to be kept alive in sustained temperatures of 36-38 degrees, and destined for the delight of gourmets in far-off Demerara.

Casks and boxes of dired Newfoundland codfish will provide traditional fare for residents of Grenada, St. Lucia, Montserrat, Demerara and Dominica. From the farmlands of central Nova Scotia come carefully packed shipments of eggs; high quantities of potatoes from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will accompany them to Bermuda, Trinidad, Montserrat, Antigua, Barbados and St. Kitts.

Annapolis Valley produce, including the world-famous apples, as well as celery, lettuce, cabbage, onions, turnips and beans are stowed in the holds; to be unloaded as the big ship threads her way through among the Caribbean Islands to British Guiana.

**Praises Abstract Painter's Work.**  
LONDON (CP) — Jean - Paul Riopelle, a young painter from Montreal, who has been living in Paris for some years, receives warm praise for works on show at a Mayfair gallery.

John Golding, writing in the New Statesman and Nation, says it is hard to imagine where a painter like Riopelle, "already in full command of a highly sophisticated abstract idiom and apparently uninterested in man and the world around him," can go to next.

"His canvases, sombre and original in color, are built up layer by layer until the surfaces acquire a tactile three-dimensional feel. As he looks at them, the original flat tapestry-like effect vanishes; slowly the whole canvas becomes animated, planes of color come to life, sliding, tipping and interweaving, forming spatial relationships of infinite complexity and subtlety."

"The handling of paint is mastery; each area, each slab of color in the canvas, every one of the 1,000 touches plays its part."

The exhibition is an annual one given by art expert Dudley Tooth, who collects work of promising artists in France. Riopelle is the only abstract painter represented.

**Hope Worst Past In Middle East**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States Friday was reported considering a mutual security pact for Israel as a means of further simmering down the Middle East.

Democratic and Republican leaders of Congress came away from a White House conference with President Eisenhower voicing optimism and faith in his handling the tense situation.

Eisenhower was said to have told them that, while no man can foretell the future in the area, the peak of the crisis may have passed.

**Report Uranium Mines Wrecked**  
EISENSTADT, Austria (Reuters)—Hungarian refugees arriving Friday said anti-Russian rebels at Mecsek had blown "sky high" the uranium mines there to prevent them from falling into Soviet hands.

"They did the job so thoroughly that the place will yield no uranium for years to come," one refugee said.

He then read the U.S. resolution and asked for quick adoption of it. The UN has set machinery in motion to help the Hungarians. Lodge said. He pleaded that it be given a chance to work.

"The Soviet Union has already paid an immense price for this bullying of a defenceless people," Lodge said. "We must not let the memory of this outrage die."

Describing conditions in Hungary, he said: "Hospitals are ablaze. Red Cross units have been attacked. Other Red Cross activities have been halted on Soviet orders. Such interference with the flow of medicine had been ignored."
