Canada Gets First Points At Olympics As Sask. Man Wins Trapshooting

HELSINKI, July 27 (CP) — George Genereux of Saskatoon, a 17-year-old high school student who shoots as casually as a man flicks the ashes off his cigar, won the Olympic trapshooting championship Saturday and gave Canada its first points in the 1952 games.

In a hair-raising finish, Genereux scored 192 of a possible 200 points in the two-day competition to defeat a class of five, including several former world champions.

Genereux nosed out Knut Holmquist of Malmo, Sweden, who finished one point behind. Last week the Canadian youth defeated the 34-year-old Swedish merchant at Oslo to win the world championship.

Today the strains of "O Canada" were heard here for the first time as Genereux received the gold medal at a ceremony in an open field at suburban Malmi.

Only a handful of spectators were present as he stepped to the podium and a Finnish military band played Canada's national anthem.

The setting was in sharp contrast with the victory ceremonies at Helsinki's Olympic Stadium where 70,000 usually half track and field champions. A few Canadians saw Genereux receive the gold medal, Canada's first since Frank Amyot of Ottawa won the padding singles at Berlin in 1936.

The Canadians included two officials of the Canadian Olympic Association, Jack Davies and Ken Farmer of Montreal, and basketball player Woody Campbell of Tillsonburg, Ont.

The contest between the crew-cropped Canadian and Holmquist was a close one. Genereux, who was the gallery's favorite, fired his last round with a 24 out of a possible 25.

That left Holmquist the only contestant able to catch him. Holmquist, shooting his first year in international competition, needed a 25 for a tie and shoot-off.

Twenty-three birds burst before his shotgun blasts. Then he missed the 24th and the title went to Canada — the Dominion's first Olympic trapshooting crown since W. H. Ewin of Montreal won in 1908.

Genereux predicted before the tournament that a score of 192 would win. He was right on the button.

His teammate, Ray Cole of Hamilton, finished 13th.
