United States' Finances.

We are accustomed to think of the United States' Government as if it were in the happy condition of not knowing what to do with all the money that is flowing into its Treasury.

The regular annual appropriations already passed and those pending, which, of course, must, in the main pass, amount to \$359,000,000.

If you will add to the \$469,000,000 already included in my estimate, the \$12,000,000 (I give the lowest estimate for the sugar countries and the shipping subsidies) and \$12,000,000 only for the new pensions, the aggregate will increase to \$493,000,000.

I do not know whether the republican majority mean to suspend the river and har-

bor bill, but I have heard the suggestion that they may do so; also that the president may purchase, not pass, the harbor bill should veto it.

You will perceive that there is no theory on which to argue; but an actual condition exists for the people of the United States to consider.

There is an additional expenditure to be added. It will arise if the federal elections bill passes the senate and is generally put in operation.

So the ingenuity of the Republicans has, it seems, solved the difficulty which troubled President Cleveland.

A Fine Sea Trip.

The Winthrop was built in 1887 at Bath, Maine. She is 195 feet from stem to stern, 38 feet wide, 23 feet deep, 1,019 tons net, having main, saloon and hurricane decks, screw propeller, triple expansion condensing engine.

On her last trip from New York every state room was occupied, so in future it will be wise to secure quarters in advance.

Awful Powder Explosion.

AT LEAST 10 PERSONS KILLED AND 30 SERIOUSLY INJURED.—THIRTEEN HUNDRED KEGS BLOWN UP.

A terrible explosion occurred at King's Powder Mills, on the Little Miami railroad, 29 miles from Cincinnati, O., on the afternoon of Tuesday last.

The explosion followed, and immediately afterward another car containing 300 kegs of gunpowder, blew up, making 1,300 kegs altogether. William Frauly, a Little Miami brakeman, was blown to atoms, and no trace of him has yet been found.
