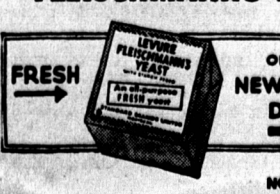

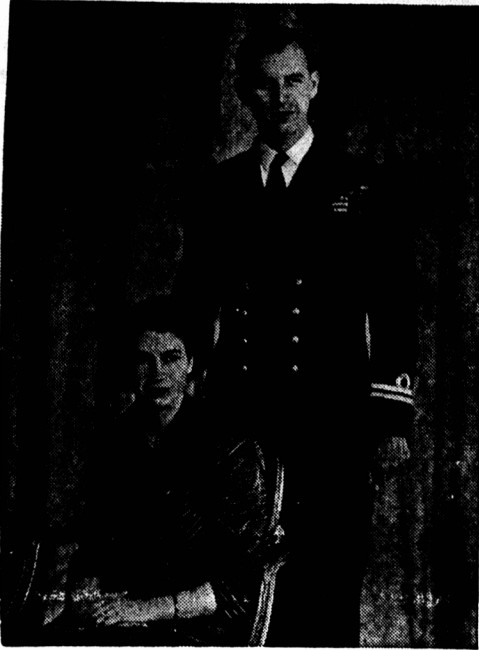

Summer Fashions Show Retreat From '1920s Look'

PARIS, April 20 - (AP) - Summer fashions now being shown by Jacques Fath and Molynoux indicate a retreat from the straight-up-and-down "1920s look" introduced earlier this year by French designers.

Skirt lengths remain the same, but the models displayed are generally more feminine looking. Fath has abandoned his masculine-looking starched shirtwaists, high wing collars and bow ties.

Fath uses a tremendous amount of pale cafe-creme and grey-colored chiffon, trims it lavishly with fur. One dress, accented throughout, had a hoop of mink slung around the deep circular neckline.

His coats are extraordinary affairs, often slit right through the back from collar to hem, completely revealing the dress worn beneath.

All are loose-hanging tent styles with a cutaway tulip line in front and elbow length sleeves cuffed with fur.

Fath shows no tailored suits. Instead, he sets loose, cutaway, jackets made up in dark mauve, bright pink or lime yellow, above narrow black skirts.

Molynoux suits have sloping shoulders - no padding in them at all - and very tight waists. He shows the same sort of loose coats as Fath, but concentrates on floral, chiffon and shadow lace for summer dresses. He sunray pleats the skirts and puffs them out with stiffening.

Molynoux introduces a feminized version of the straight-up-and-down dress. He has accented pleating falling from a lain shoulder yoke which has epaulette sleeves. He repeats the same design in every conceivable material.

Strip-tease beachwear is highlighted by Fath and Molynoux. Fath shows detachable skirts that unveil miniature skirts set over nappin pantsies. Molynoux covers up brief pleated shorts with a long yellow and black cotton printed sarong.

U. S. Woman Envoy Mrs. Ambassador At Danish Court

COPENHAGEN, April 19 - (AP) - Mrs. Eugenie Anderson, of Red Wing, Minn., is the most frequently interviewed and photographed person in Denmark.

The first United States woman ambassador in four months has won the hearts of four million Danes. Danish papers print detailed reports on her wardrobe. Her official residence, "Rydhave," has been photographed over and over again.

The arrival of Mrs. Anderson, with her husband and two children, gave the Danish foreign office a diplomatic headache. While it stewed and fretted with protocol, the blonde, smiling Mrs. Anderson busied herself making friends with the Danes.

The problem was how to address her. The royal court itself solved that one. Rather than the French "Madame Anouassadeur," the court to the foreign office, it preferred the English "Mrs. Ambassador."

Since her arrival, official duties have taken most of Mrs. Anderson's time. She has met all the foreign ambassadors in Denmark and most of the ministers. The Dutch, Norwegian and French ambassadors are among the Anderson's special friends.

Danes don't care much for ceremony. You will find the King's telephone number in the directory and you can call him if you wish. Hence it was natural for Prime Minister Hans Hedtoft to phone Mrs. Anderson and ask, since his office was being redecorated, would she mind waiting a few weeks to make her official call.

"Of course not," Mrs. Anderson replied. She likes the Danish way of life. "It is so much like the American way."

Accomplished Linguists

Danes usually speak several languages. King Frederick speaks English, French, Norwegian, German and Swedish. So does Queen Ingrid.

Foreign Minister Gustav Rasmussen is an accomplished linguist. At a banquet, Mrs. Anderson heard him converse in German, English, French, Spanish, Italian and Russian, "which impressed me very much."

Mrs. Anderson arrives at her office at 8 a. m. and leaves at 5:30 in the afternoon. Her staff consists of 150, half are men and half women.

After hours, Mrs. Anderson studies Danish with phonograph records to get acquainted with the rhythm and swing of the language. When she has time she plans to take four lessons weekly.

Cook's Corner

COUNTRY KITCHEN BROWN STEW

2 pounds beef chuck, cut into 1 1/2 inch cubes

2 tablespoons fat

4 cups boiling water

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 clove garlic

1 medium-sized onion, sliced

2 bay leaves

1 tablespoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1/2 teaspoon paprika

Dash all-spice or cloves

1 teaspoon sugar

6 carrots, quartered

1 dozen small white onions

Dredge meat cubes in well seasoned flour; brown well on all sides in hot fat; add boiling water, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, garlic, onion, bay leaves, and seasonings. Simmer 2 hours; stirring occasionally. Add carrots and onions; continue to cook for 20 to 30 minutes longer, or until vegetables tender. (Cubed potatoes may be added, if desired.)

Remove meat and vegetables; thicken liquid for gravy. Serves 6 to 8.
