

Giants Move Closer To League Leading Dodgers

The New York Giants moved a little closer to league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers last night in the National League but Cleveland Indians, despite a tight, five-hit effort by big Garcia, remained 3 1/2 games behind New York Yankees in the American League.

The Giants defeated Philadelphia Phillies in extra innings 4-3 to close to win seven games of the Dodgers. Meanwhile, in a night contest the Boston Braves gained their first 1953 victory over the Brooks 6-3 in 11 innings.

In the American League Gil McDougald led an old-fashioned Yankee power display with two home runs and five RBIs as the world champions routed Philadelphia Athletics 12-2. Cleveland, in a day game shut out the last-place Detroit Tigers 2-0.

The Giants, like the night before when they beat the Phillies 4-3 in 10 innings, went 11 innings last night before outfielder Monte Irvin hit a single with the bases loaded and one out to fetch home the winning run. Relief pitcher Al Corwin, who received credit for his fourth straight victory against no defeats, launched the deciding rally in the 11th of the 11th with a single.

The Braves beat Brooklyn after taking 14 drubblings. Sid Gordon's two-out single against reliever Joe Black drove in Johnny Logan with the deciding run.

A fourth-inning homer by big Luke Easter and a double and a single in the seventh inning produced Cleveland's two lone runs and gave them an even split in the two-game series with the Tigers. Garcia's victory was his 18th of the season against nine losses and marked the first time this year he has beaten the Tigers.

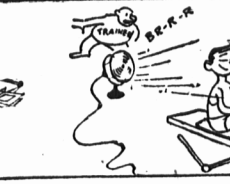
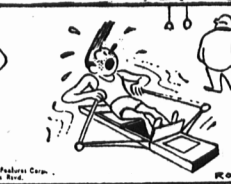

One of Miracle Players Dies

BALTIMORE, Sept. 4 (AP)—Charles J. (Butcher Boy) Schmidt, one of the "miracle men" of the Boston Braves team that climbed all the way out of the National League cellar on the fourth of July to win the 1914 World Series, died today.

Schmidt, 66-year-old meat dealer, collapsed suddenly as he was inspecting cattle this morning at Union Stockyards. He weighed more than 240 and had been having trouble with his heart the last five or six years.

Harridge Rejects Indians Request

CHICAGO, Sept. 4 (AP)—Will Harridge, president of the American Baseball League, today rejected a protest by the Cleveland Indians of their "battle of the tarpaulin" in the finale of a Labor Day twin bill at St. Louis.

In the contest, rain twice halted play, wiped out three sixth-inning Cleveland runs, and resulted in a 2-1 Browns' win in five innings.

Cleveland protested that a porous canvas failed to protect the playing field, that a deliberate attempt was made to avoid making the field playable by Brownie president Bill Veeck, and that the game contradicted a league ruling that every effort should be made to complete the regular schedule.

Young Australian Whips Top-Ranked Vic Seixas

FOREST HILLS, Sept. 4 (AP)—Ken Rosewall, a 17-year-old Australian kid with one of the finest tennis brains ever turned out, made his first appearance in the American championships a memorable one today by whipping the U.S. top-ranked player, Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, in a tinging fourth round match before 10,000 cheering fans.

In producing the first major upset of the title event and severely scrambling America's immediate tennis future, the dark-haired 135-pounder from Sydney displayed a remarkable all-court game for which neither the crowd nor Seixas was fully prepared.

The scores were 6-6, 6-2, 7-5, 6-7, 6-3. Seixas, a member of the last American Davis Cup team and, until today at least, an outstanding candidate to help challenge the Aussies again next winter, played to the limit of his ability every point of the way. But he could never reach the net consistently against the sharp-shooting kid from down under and so met defeat.

In tomorrow's quarter-final round the amazing youngster, who, like all the other Australian stars, works for a sports equipment firm, will face a fading American more than twice his age, 38-year-old Gardner Mulloy of Miami, Fla.

Defending champion, Frank Sedgman of Australia, and Dick Savitt of Orange, N. J., the only remaining American who appears capable of slowing the Aussie push scored routine three-set victories.

Sedgman was never extended in turning back Billy Talbert of New York by 6-1, 6-3, 6-3, and Savitt trouncing Art Larsen, of San Francisco, 6-3, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4. Talbert yesterday eliminated the last surviving Canadian in the singles, Brendan Macken of Montreal.

Mervyn Rose, the Australian left-hander, made short work of St. Bernard Bartzten from Fort St. Vrain, Okla., 6-0, 6-2, 6-1, and will face Savitt tomorrow. Lewis Hoad, the other Aussie 17-year-old, looks almost as good as Rosewall in trouncing Art Larsen, of San Francisco, 6-3, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4. Though he was
