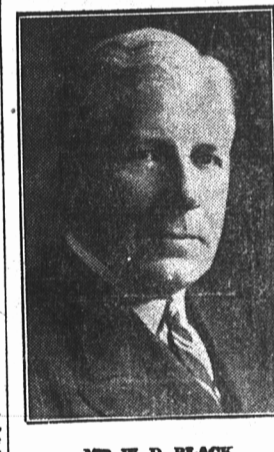

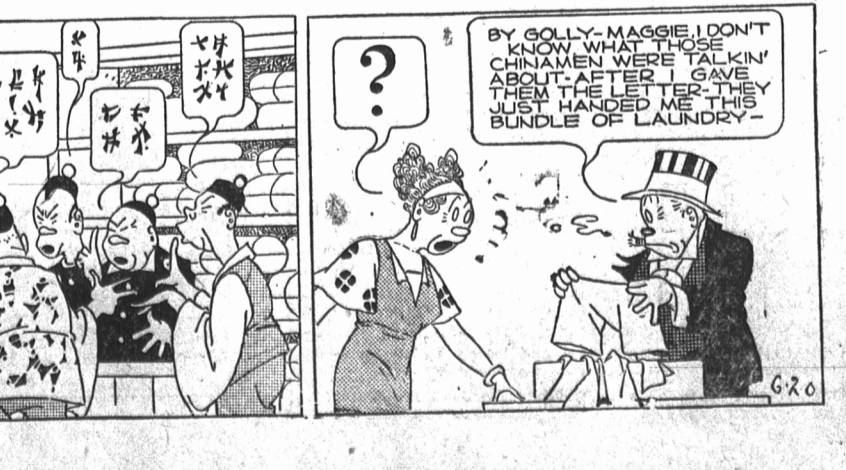

Canada Her Own Best Customer For Farm Goods

Manufacturers in Annual Meeting Discuss Trade and Export Problems, Defence and Other Questions.
BIGWIN ISLAND, Ont., June 19 (CP)—Canada's vulnerability in the event of war was discussed by W. D. Black, Hamilton, Ont., in his presidential address at the opening luncheon of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association's three-day annual convention opening today at this Lake-of-Bays summer resort.
The association was concerned with national defence, not only as manufacturers, but also as citizens. "It is obvious that, if a country cannot defend itself from attack, the lives and liberties of its citizens are in jeopardy," Mr. Black declared. "All material possessions such as money, bonds, bank deposits, houses, factories, farms and all other forms of property, are at the mercy of an invader."
While the question of defence was dealt with at length, the president's address referred to domestic problems and urged remedies. The efforts of other countries to become self-sustaining had led to a decline in Canadian exports of primary products.
National Markets
Mr. Black pointed out that the manufacturers of Canada bought Canadian farm products for use in making goods in Canada to the amount of about double the value of all Canadian farm products in their natural state. In other words, Canadian factories provided twice as good a market for Canadian farm products in the natural state as all other countries combined.
"During the fiscal year ended March, 1938 Canadian export trade consisted of 40.2 per cent full manufactured goods, 33.2 per cent semi-manufactured goods and only 26.6 per cent other products," Mr. Black emphasized. "In effect, the world was saying to Canada, '73 per cent of your exports to us are to be fully manufactured or partly manufactured products.'"

ing weapons and methods, we will go down to destruction unless we are prepared and able to resist and we will lose, not only our material possessions, but also what is most important, our lives and liberties as well. It must be realized that Canada is in a far more vulnerable position than she was in the Great War."
Pointing out the predominant role which industry played in modern warfare, Mr. Black said that, acting on the belief, along with other countries, that there would be no more great wars, at least for several generations, Canada had neglected its defences; with the result that today the country was woefully behind in preparation, lamentably under-manned in personnel, and deficient in equipment for defence. "Some progress had been made during the last two years in the face of great difficulties but, after 19 years of indifference and neglect, much remained to be done and the national program should be extended and (Continued on page 8, Col 4)
