LADY TO REST.—The funeral of the late Miss Bridget Lantry took place this morning, and the large number of citizens in attendance testified to the esteem in which she was held. The school children attended in a body. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Geo. E. Hughes, Robert Fennell, W. F. Carter, Patrick Blake, Alexander Macdonald, and Angus Macdonald. The Pontifical Mass of Requiem in St. Dunstan's Cathedral was celebrated by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rev. J. J. Macdonald, and Rev. J. F. Johnston. Rev. I. R. A. Macdonald directed the ceremonies. The altar was appropriately draped, and the congregation was very large.

LOST HER PROPELLOR.—Word was received Saturday by the Halifax agents of the Dominion Coal Company, to the effect that the Coban is in difficulties 45 miles W N W of St. Pierre. She was reported at 11 a. m. Friday as having lost her propeller. The Bonavista, now on her way from St. John's to Sydney, would probably pick her up. In case of a failure on the part of the latter boat to run across the straits, the Douglas H. Thomas, lying at Louisburg, was despatched to the scene. The Coban is bound from Sydney to St. John's, Nfld., with a cargo of coal. She was to be paid off for the winter at this port about the last of the month. Now that she has met with an accident she will probably finish her voyage after repairing and then stop running until next summer.—Halifax Herald.

MORNING OF CITY COUNCIL.

Last Meeting This Year—Summary of the Business Transacted.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Dawson presiding and every member of the Board being in his place.

After routine proceedings Mayor Dawson reported that the \$10,000 of city debentures had been sold at 5 1/4 per cent premium, that King Street engine house had been sold to Edward Flynn for \$701 and the deed executed, and that he had been served with a summons from Wallace Wheatley, who claimed a refund of milk vendor's license for 1896.

The Mayor was authorized to have the Recorder defend the city in the Wheatley case.

The Recorder's opinion in the Redmond case was then read. His Honor expressed the opinion that Mr. Redmond's claim was barred by the Statute of Limitation. Mr. Redmond made application for damages for losses sustained during the smallpox epidemic twelve years ago.

A letter was read from the Board of Fire Underwriters referring to the necessity there was for the appointment of an electrical inspector, and intimating that the Board was willing to pay \$100 per annum for such an official provided the city supplement his salary with a sum sufficient to procure the services of a capable man, the appointment to be approved by the Board.

A petition from officers Bradley, Taylor and Doyle, asking for new overcoats, was referred to the police committee to report upon the next meeting of Council.

A petition asking that Government Pond be flooded so as to afford skating during the winter months, and that an electric light be placed at or near the said pond, was read. The City Surveyor was instructed to have the pond flooded for the purpose of making a sheet of ice for skating, he to use his own judgment in accordance with the prayer of the petition.

Councillor Johnson moved that the Fire Board be authorized to engage the services of Mr. W. P. Doull, in accordance with the provisions of the report received some time ago, at a salary of \$100 a year, he to also receive \$100 a year from the Fire Underwriters.

It was moved in amendment by Councillor Hughes that tenders be called for keeping the fire alarm in order and providing all material for repairs for one year, subject to supervision of the city Fire Board, tenders to be left with the City Clerk on or before noon on Monday the 27th inst.

The amendment was carried on the casting vote of the Mayor.

The Mayor was authorized to issue debentures amounting to \$3,000 for a period of 20 years, bearing interest at 4 per cent per annum, in addition to the \$3,000 voted on September 14, 1896, for the construction of the park roadway.

The tender of John Coombs was accepted for printing the City Report, it being the lowest.

Council adjourned sine die.
