

Officials Call For Tenders On Moncton CNR Diesel Shop

MONCTON—Tenders are being called by C. N. Railways for construction of a diesel shop at the Moncton hump yard, a \$15 million electronic classification freight yard which on completion will rank with the most modern in the world.

Announcement that bids are being invited for the diesel shop, which is to be the largest building in the 330-acre yard, was made here yesterday by R. P. Puddester, the company's chief engineer in the Atlantic region.

Tenders for supply of the structural steel frame are being called separately.

Measuring 263 feet by 340 feet, the ultramodern diesel repair and service installation at the sprawling yard on Moncton's western outskirts will be patterned after similar new shops at CNR yards at Cole de Liesse, Montreal and Edmonton, Alta.

The unique design, developed by Canadian National architects, differs from that used by other railroads inasmuch as the centre section of the ground floor is used as a utility centre, with lead-in tracks from either end.

Other facilities of this kind use the original in-out shop length track system.
