

Diefenbaker Addresses Large S'ide Audience

"Here you are in this province, and many of the opportunities that should have come to you under Confederation," stated John Diefenbaker, Progressive Conservative Party Leader, as he addressed a large public meeting in the Capitol Theatre in Summerside Monday afternoon, presided over by Dr. Hubert McNeill, president of the Prince County Progressive Conservative Association.

MacLean has made himself heard. "I can never understand people finding themselves amidst all the difficulties and vicissitudes of fortune which are yours here in P.E.I. yet year after year, election after election, you decide to send Parliament Members, and I speak particularly of the Maritimes, who make their greatest contribution in the silence that they preserve."

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Sacked Admiral Brings New Demands For Public Hearing

LONDON (Reuters)—A retired British admiral's 16-year-long battle to clear his name brought new demands Monday for a public investigation of his case.

The story began when stocky, side-whiskered Admiral Sir Dudley North was relieved of his command because he allegedly permitted six French warships to the Mediterranean in September, 1940.

A few days later, the warships, obedient to orders from the Vichy government, opposed the landing of fighting French and British troops in the African port of Dakar. Their presence had been blamed for the costly failure of the allied action — two years before the allies' successful North African landings.

The London Daily Mirror Monday urged a public hearing for the 75-year-old admiral, who now lives in a little stone cottage close to the sea on Britain's south coast in the county of Dorset.

NO HEARING
The newspaper said North lost his post as British commander in the North Atlantic without any hearing, inquiry or court martial. Five admirals of the fleet appeared in vain for a hearing.

"It is not too late to reopen the case of the sacked admiral," the Mirror said. "It is never too late to do justice. . . . This old sailor should be given a public hearing. "He was broken and disgraced by secret justice."

The admiral's case is put to the public Monday in a book by a British newspaper man, Noel Monks, entitled "That Day at Gibraltar." It tells how North's demands for a chance to clear himself by an impartial inquiry have been repeatedly rejected by the admiralty and Parliament.

CHESTS OF DOCUMENTS
The admiral has four sea chests full of documents at his vine-covered cottage near Beamstead, Dorset, which he released for publication.

"They should stir the admiralty up a bit," he told reporters. "I felt that by laying out all the facts, something will now have to be done."

The grey-haired, stooped admiral, who escorted the late King George VI to the throne in 1939, steadfastly claims he was ordered not to interfere with the French ships.

EMPHASIZED LAND REFORM
He made no reference to wheat marketing problems, but instead emphasized the need for land reform to make sure Canadian farmers are efficient and that Canada does not fall behind in food production. With the exception of grain, Canada was not producing any substantial food surpluses.

"As our population increases, we must be able to produce more of those foods because it won't be a crime against humanity to sell it, with the vast areas of land and water which are included in our country, we got ourselves into the position where we did not produce enough food for our own people and had to rely on other less fortunate and more densely populated countries to share their food supplies with us."
