Air Cadet Committee Holds Annual Meeting

Last evening at the Robson's Restaurant, Summerside, the annual meeting of the provincial committee of the Air Cadet League of Canada was held and in the absence of the provincial chairman, Roy Johnstone, the meeting was presided over by F/O J. Harry Waugh, D.F.C., who extended a welcome to all present.

The civic welcome was given by His Honor Henry W. Wedge. Reports of the various chairmen were received and it indicated that a great deal of work has been done in the advancement of the league in the Province. The report of the president showed that the two R.C.A.F. Wing Associations, one in Summerside and the other in Charlottetown, had since their formation sponsored the Air Cadet movement and had done much in assisting the squadrons to attain the high degree of efficiency they have. The report referred to the great loss sustained by the death of Mr. A. R. Brennan, who had done so much for the advancement of the movement in this Province. The splendid work done by the officers of the two provincial squadrons was highly commended by the chairman.

F/L Murray Shanks, the commanding officer of the Summerside squadron said that at the first parade held in January about 30 boys had shown up and that by June the number had risen to 84. He dealt with the progress that had been made since the formation of the squadron and said that one of the main reasons for the progress made was the splendid co-operation received from the commanding officer of the Summerside R.C.A.F. Station, who had placed the facilities of the port at their disposal.

Mr. H. L. Garner, president of the Air Cadet League of Canada, Ottawa, paid tribute to the memory of Mr. A. R. Brennan and the fine work he had done prior to his death. Mr. Garner said he had been closely associated with Mr. Brennan, not only in the Air Cadet movement, but in the newspaper association as well.

He went on to say that he was astounded at the progress made by local Air Cadets, and at the splendid reports handed in by the various chairmen. "When you work with boys", he said, "you are working with the greatest asset in Canada. It is not the air officers at Ottawa who make the Air Cadet League, it is you members who are working at squadron level who do," he said.

He stated that the expansion programme is going well and said that it is further advanced here in Prince Edward Island than in any other province. Regarding exchange visits to other countries, he contended that the air cadets are just about the finest ambassadors this country ever had. While the air exchange visits are good for the cadets the real benefit, he said, accrues to the countries they visit, for they create a better understanding with the people of these countries and ours.

Air Commodore A. D. Ross, group captain of the Maritime Group, Halifax, spoke of the interest and the enthusiasm shown in this Province in the Air Cadet League of Canada. He expressed appreciation to the Air Force Association for taking over the sponsorship of the two squadrons.

Mr. George Ross, managing director of the Air Cadet League, Ottawa, addressed the meeting on matters of general interest to the members.

Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, commanding officer of the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, dealt with the pleasant association he had experienced so far with the league, which he thought, has come along splendidly and he said he was glad to be able to provide all the assistance he could to the movement. - S.

Princess Late For Date With Gen. Eisenhower

(By Don Campbell) PARIS, Nov. 23 - (Reuters) - Princess Margaret's chauffeur took the wrong road today and kept Gen. Dwight Eisenhower cooling his heels on the Supreme Headquarters doorstep for 20 minutes. When Margaret finally did turn up for her tea date with the Supreme Commander and his wife, Eisenhower greeted her: "Your Royal Highness, it is so nice to see you. Did you have a nice trip?" The Princess explained that her auto took the wrong road, landing her in the heart of Versailles. The cavalcade of autos turned around and sped back, taking the next-and-right-turn to this headquarters.

Margaret was first due at 4:15 p.m., but the British embassy phoned to say she had left 15 minutes late. She eventually arrived at 4:35. The Princess wore a black velvet cloche hat and three-quarter-length chinchilla fur coat and was accompanied by her lady-in-waiting, Lady Jean Rankine. Eisenhower and the Princess chatted as they walked up a long corridor to where they joined high officers from 10 of the 12 Atlantic Pact countries. The Princess stayed an hour and when she left was escorted to the front entrance by the Supreme Commander and Mrs. Eisenhower.

Awarded Dominion Legion Scholarship

Last year she took two year's work in one at Prince of Wales College, winning her certificate and finishing in 14th place in the second year.
