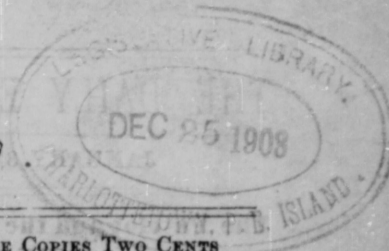

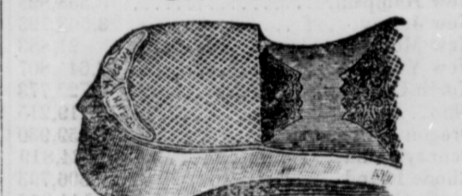

Toronto's New Sensation.

A FATHER SENDS HIS DAUGHTER TO A LUNATIC ASYLUM SO AS TO GET HER PROPERTY.

A case is now pending before the Toronto courts which will prove to be the most sensational one that has been known there for years. The plaintiff is one Miss Catherine Monaghan, and the defendant is her father, Miss Monaghan claims that at the death of her mother she left an estate with a revenue of \$2,000 per year. She says her father wished to get possession of the estate, and while the pair were in Buffalo last year he inveigled her into the Providence lunatic asylum, where she was kept two weeks, when she was discharged by the visiting physicians of the institution. Monaghan says that the property rightfully belongs to him, but was deced by his wife to the daughter. He sent his daughter to Buffalo on the recommendation of a doctor, but did not know it to be an asylum. Efforts have been made to keep the case quiet.

His False Teeth Killing Him.

THE SAD PREDICAMENT OF A PENNSYLVANIA FARMER.

James Caldwell, a Middlesex farmer, is in all probability the most unhappy man in Western Pennsylvania. A short time ago the vulcanized rubber plate which held his false teeth in position broke while he was eating, and a piece of the plate, about two inches in length and containing several teeth, passed down into his stomach. Shortly after he was seized with violent pains approaching convulsions, and since that time his sufferings have been steadily increasing. He summoned physicians, but the only consolation they could afford him was that life might be prolonged a short time, yet fatal results must inevitably ensue. They state that artificial teeth as well as plate are composed of materials which remain obdurate under the most corrosive acids, hence their dissolution in the stomach or alimentary track is out of the question.

News of the Day.

Sexton is getting better.

Spain is to have a new navy. The cortes has just voted \$9,000,000 for one.

A Chinaman in New York is named Takh Takh. It is not stated, but we suppose he is a barber.

The Spanish government has decided to celebrate the fourth centenary of the discovery of America.

Smith and Kilrain have been engaged to box nightly at the London Aquarium, for a week in February, and will receive £1,000.

Daniel Manning, ex-Secretary of the Treasury in President Cleveland's cabinet, died on Saturday afternoon of Bright's disease.

Thomas Thompson, a respected old resident of Adelaide township, Ont., has received fatal injuries through a fall down stairs. He was blind.

The messenger boy in the Western Union Telegraph office at Pictou, N. S., is said to be only 15 years of age, but he stands 6 feet 3 1/2 inches in his "socks."

The Phoenix Coal Company, which intends to operate the Joggins mines, has been granted letters patent. The capital stock is \$50,000, in 5,000 shares of \$10 each.

John Gillis, a teamster of Indian-town, St. John, cut one of his fingers while chopping kindling wood one day last week. Lockjaw resulted and he died the following morning.

The gift from President Cleveland to the Pope has arrived at Rome. The present is a copy of the United States constitution, beautifully engrossed and richly bound in book form.

A cyclone tore over the hill in front of Patrick Kieley's, Baddeck River, C. B., on Tuesday about dinner time, and scattered his fences. It then struck his best barn, and ripped it into atoms, carrying some of the boards as far as the bank of the river.

C. G. Marten, who did business under the name of Marten Brothers, private bankers, at Leamington, Ont., is alleged to have absconded. His indebtedness to depositors does not exceed \$2,000 as far as known. It is stated he could not have taken less than \$50,000 with him.

Herr Paschke, a Berlin butcher, recently celebrated a curious "jubilee"—the slaughter of the 100,000th goose in his establishment. He began business in 1869, and on Dec. 2 was able to kill the jubilee goose—a choice specimen, specially fattened for the occasion.

Mr. Lingham, the well-known cattle exporter of Belleville, Ont., has just received through Lord Dufferin the appointment of manager, in India, of the cattle estates of the Nizam of Hyderabad, who will be remembered as having given \$2,000,000 towards the fortifications and defence of India a short time ago.

The increase in the public demand for electric lighting all over the United States is far in advance of the expectations of those engaged in the business, and the manufacturing companies are over-crowded with orders. New York electricians agree that next year will see the biggest boom ever known in the electric lighting business.

Returns from 12 gold mines in Nova Scotia for the month of November last show a total of 2,517 tons of quartz crushed, with a return of 1,055 ounces of gold, valued at \$21,100. One mill gives the enormous yield of 19 1/2 ounces of gold from 6 1/2 tons of quartz crushed, while another the small return of 3 1/2 ounces from 299 tons of quartz.
