A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last evening at 5:15 to meet a delegation from the Summerside Athletic Association. This committee requested permission to have a fence, eight feet high, erected around the baseball diamond. The reason put forth for this was a matter which required careful consideration. The athletic committee also pointed out that in the absence of an indoor rink in Summerside some provision should be made to provide at least two outdoor ice surfaces for the use of the children of the town especially.

The council was requested to provide an ice surface at the Queen Elizabeth Park, on the lot between the football field and another in the west end on Notre Dame Street. The council agreed to provide both these rinks and Mayor Wedge said last night that it was understood that the town would keep the ice surfaces in condition and take care of snow removal, etc.

At last night's meeting the council formally accepted the resignation of the Town Clerk, Mr. J. Hale Strong. Mr. John E. Cameron is at present the acting town clerk and has filled this position for the past several months.
