THREE SECRETS, CO-STARS PARKER, NEAL AND ROMAN

Three femme stars in one Hollywood studio car sometimes hit a bit much, three on one set are pretty certain to require deft handling, but three in one picture--in almost every scene together--is surefire dynamite! Or so it would seem anyway.

But the dope sheet was completely upset recently when Eleanor Parker, Patricia Neal and Ruth Roman, three new and up-and-coming stars with probably the three brightest acting futures in Hollywood today, came together and played the lead roles in "Three Secrets", the amazing Warner Bros. drama produced by Milton Sperling. The film, which comes to the Prince Edward Theatre on Tuesday is the story of three young mothers who had to give up their babies at birth only to have a little boy survivor of a plane crash 5 years later suddenly enter into their lives.

When interviewed, each gave the credit first to Director Robert Wise (Ed. Note: Who must have lived up to his surname), and then to the other two. Pat Neal, tall and beautiful, who has already made two pictures with Harry Cooper, said, "Our roles are of equal importance, and Bob Wise impressed that on us as an integral part of the story. I suppose that made things go so smoothly."

Ruth Roman, tempestuous brunette, playing a bad-girl role in the film, thought it was because Eleanor Parker had so recently become a mother and knew best how a mother felt that her feelings were so easily transferred to the other two. But Miss Parker had the simplest reason: "We just like each other," she said. "Pat Neal and Ruthie Roman are two swell girls."

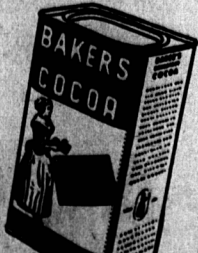
