SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES.—According to an Ottawa despatch to the Patriot, the supplementary estimates tabled on Wednesday night contain, besides \$4,000 for the Park roadway, \$500 towards the erection of an orderly room in the drill shed at Charlottetown, and a like sum for repairs to the pier at Belfast and to the breakwater at Rustico. There are also \$250 for Tignish harbor, besides \$10,000 for tug service during the winter between Capes Traverse and Fortune.

MARRIED AN INDIAN CHIEF.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Just two years ago Hattie Hashagan, whose decorative paintings have delighted thousands at the Art exhibitions, arranged with an Indian named Thunder Cloud to pose as her model for a picture of wild western life. Thunder Cloud, who is a big strapping fellow, straight as an arrow, with piercing black eyes, a brighter face than most Indians, and altogether a noble representative of his race, fell in love with the artist, and now they are married. Thunder Cloud was born in Coughnawaga country in Canada, about forty years ago, and a few years later was carried as a papoose to Northern Minnesota. His mother was a full blood Sioux, and his father a half breed Chippewa. When twenty years of age he was taken to Europe by Buffalo Bill and was the most admired of the Redskins who appeared with the Wild West Show before the nobility. Since his return to New York he has earned a good living by posing and selling Indian curiosities. In the city directory, Thunder Cloud's name appears as Dominic Plante, but to their friends the couple are known as Mr. and Mrs. Thunder Cloud.

NEWS NOTES.

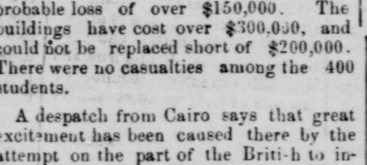
There is a marked change in the tone of the Russian press towards England. It is stated in Rome that negotiations are pending between England and Italy with a view to the latter holding in readiness a large body of troops to sail at a moment's notice to the Levant. The Cairo correspondent of the London Times believes there is some truth in a native report that the Khedive is now making a tour of Europe in disguise, and that he has taken with him a scheme for Egyptian independence. The billions in the Bank of England decreased £769,027 during the past week. The proportion of the Bank of England reserve to liability, which last week was 35.45 per cent., is now 52.14 per cent. The Bank of England's rate of discount remains unchanged at 3 per cent. The patronage of the Bank of England belongs entirely to the directors, a clerk being appointed by each director in rotation until the vacancies are filled, with the exception of one clerkship in every seven, which is given to a son of one of the members of the establishment who has discharged his duties to the satisfaction of the directors. John C. Bowdew and George W. Johnson, charged with having wrecked a mail train on the Chicago and Grand Trunk Railroad at Battle Creek, July 16, 1894, during a H. U. strike, causing the death of a fireman and the injury of a number of persons, have just been found guilty of conspiracy in the United States court at Detroit, Mich. Mount Holyoke College, South Hadley, Mass., the pioneer institution for the higher education of women, received a severe blow on Thursday afternoon in the burning of the entire main building, with a probable loss of over \$150,000. The buildings have cost over \$300,000, and could not be replaced short of \$200,000. There were no casualties among the 400 students. A despatch from Cairo says that great excitement has been caused there by the attempt on the part of the British to induce the bank to advance 25 million francs against the Egyptian revenue for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Dongola expedition. It is said that the committee of French bondholders will resist by law the attempt to raise the loan in the manner proposed. The first deficit of the Laurier Government promises to be something immense. With a probable revenue for the current fiscal year of thirty-six and a half million, the estimates submitted to Parliament provide for an expenditure of forty-four and a half million, and it is estimated that power to spend still more is to be asked in further supplementary estimates. The Montreal Gazette remarks that Mr. Laurier's is a business administration in the same sense as Mr. Mercier's was in Quebec. It will give business to the money lender. Reports continue to come to hand of an extensive Fenian movement being under way in Ireland. Thirty years ago or more the Fenian was denounced as a fool and a villain of the deepest dye. Later experience with the dynamiting assassin makes, by comparison, the Fenian who properly fitted in the open a decidedly mild fellow. He must still be set down in the category of fools, though. Ireland too small, even if it was united, to fight Great Britain, and Ireland is not united. There is only misery ahead for those who enter the new scheme. The Turkish government tribunal a few days ago sentenced on fifteen years' imprisonment each a number of Musulmans who were convicted of taking part in the recent riots. They are the rotters who have been tried and found guilty since the late massacres. The tribunal also passed sentence of death upon all of the Armenians who are known or suspected of having taken part in the seizure of the Ottoman bank. In this list is included an Armenian who was surrendered by the Belgian legation, with which he had taken refuge, upon condition that he would be released after he had been examined by the tribunal. The Belgian minister has sent a preliminary note to the porte demanding the man's liberation.

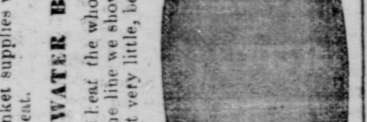
