

# Final Plans Laid For Borden Days

BORDEN — Final preparations for the opening of Borden's three-day centennial celebrations this evening have been completed, a committee official announced yesterday.

The main attractions for spectators this evening will be the large parade and a sky-diving performance. The parade moves off at 8 o'clock sharp and this will be followed by the official opening. Among the dignitaries invited to the opening are Charlottetown's Mayor A. Wallace Gaudet and W. E. Jenkins, Mayor of Summerside.

Immediately following the opening ceremonies the sky divers will perform and afterwards a reception, hosted by Mayor Gilbert Bell, will be held for visiting dignitaries. Other attractions for groups of all ages during the evening will be bingo, carnival rides and a dance.

Saturday's program begins with the start of the Northumberland Strait swim, the highlight of the three day affair. The 14 entries take to the water on the Cape Tormentine side of the strait at 9:30 and it is expected that a large number of spectators will follow their progress from boats through out most of the swim.

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While the swim is going on there will be a number of activities on the Borden side to keep spectators occupied while awaiting the swimmers. Again carnival rides will attract the children while a round robin softball tournament, which will include teams from Bonshaw, Kensington, O'Leary and Borden, will draw the sports-minded spectators.

The 45-piece Royal Canadian Artillery Band from Halifax will give a one 1/2-hour long concert in the park adjoining the rink beginning at 2 o'clock. The first swimmer is expected somewhere around 3:30 p.m.

Both this evening and Saturday evening lobster and ham suppers will be served beginning at 5 o'clock. Later in the evening the sky divers will return to give a second performance. Prizes will be presented to the lucky swimmers and the day's activities will be climaxed by a dance.

Sunday's program includes outdoor services for both Catholics and Protestants. Mass will be said at 11:15 a.m. and the Protestant service will be held at two in the afternoon. In the event of inclement weather, services will be held in the respective churches at the same times mentioned above.

He served his apprenticeship under the tutelage of Col. D. A. MacKinnon and the late Major H. L. Bethune of the MacKinnon Drug Company, and carried on the business during the First World War when Col. MacKinnon and Major Bethune were on active service.
