An informative talk on Acadia University, its past and its future prefaced by humorous remarks on history as played in Charlottetown in his youth, was given to the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday by P. E. Kelly, physical education director of the university in Wolfville, N.S.

Immediate \$10 Pension Hike Urged By Opposition Leader

OTTAWA (CP)—An immediate \$10 increase in the \$65 monthly age pension is urged Monday by Conservative Opposition Leader Diefenbaker and T. C. Douglas, Liberal Democrat Party leader.

Both leaders in the Commons said the government should proceed at once with that part of its pension plan while it seeks to work out with the provinces any constitutional difficulties in a proposed contributory portable pensions.

Mr. Diefenbaker also described as a "retreat" the government's decision to refer its pension plan to a preliminary federal-provincial meeting here July 26 and 27.

Mr. Diefenbaker said there should have been consultation with the provinces before the pension plan was introduced in Parliament as the government's decision to have consultation now was good "even though late."

At that time, it was found that the noises were caused by like minor explosions, emanated from the plant of the Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. which was all part of the company's expansion program.

Officials of the company have advised that similar noises may be heard during this week, and may recur several times during the next three months.

The noises will originate in the boiler of the plant which are to be cleaned of accumulated residue by steam pressure, in preparation for the commissioning of the new 20,000 kilowatt turbo-generator.
