# More Blocking In Football

TORONTO, Feb. 24 — (CP) — The west achieved a major victory Saturday in its annual fight for increased blocking in football as it played the leading part in having a recommendation for a two-game cup final rejected.

The Canadian rugby union at its annual three-day meeting which ended Saturday adopted the most drastic rule change in its recent history to permit practically unlimited blocking on kick-offs. It will allow backfielders and linemen on the receiving side to run interference on the kick-off to start the game and second half and play after touchdowns.

The west also attempted to have running interference apply on all kicks but the rules committee, always on guard to prevent Canadian football becoming too similar to the United States game, rejected the bid. Western delegates said they probably will make the proposal again next year when the annual meeting is held in Edmonton.

Besides turning down the proposal for a two-game east-west final in Toronto and Montreal, the C. R. U. agreed on an increase in the number of imports from seven to eight, a change in the import rule to classify U. S. players non-imports if they have resided in Canada continuously for four years and retention of the present voting powers of each league.

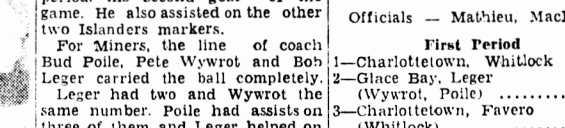

But it is true. The United States 2nd Infantry Division's bagpipe band—trained by the borders themselves—has just announced its new kilts will be made of the royal Stewart tartan.

The Borders sputtered in indignation. For not just anybody can wear the Stewart. It has been worn for centuries by the royal family. It dates from the Stuart kings themselves.

The right of others to wear it has been conferred only once or twice in the history of the British army—and then only as a solemn and high honor.
