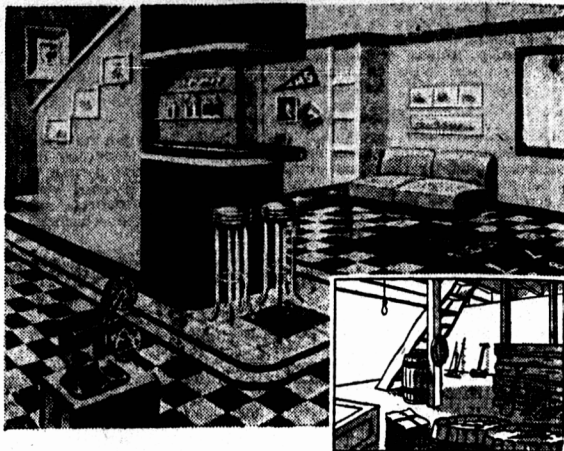
The Neighbors
