TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Wreck of the "Merrimack" HALIFAX, July 12. Passengers who arrived last evening from the wrecked steamer Merrimack say that they think the Captain and crew were not demoralized and that there was no robbery or drunkenness to their knowledge. The passengers who got on Little Hope Island are still there, as the sea is too heavy to get them off. The passengers who reached the mainland are expected to arrive by City of St. John to-night, and should they do so, will proceed to Boston by the Worcester to-morrow. The Merrimack will be a total loss.

Orange Troubles. BELFAST, July 12. The twelfth of July was celebrated by the Orangemen throughout Ulster with unusual fervor. Rev. Dr. Kane presided over a monster meeting in the city. Many violent speeches were made. The city was crowded with Orangemen from the rural districts. Several skirmishes have taken place between Orangemen and Catholics. The police were reinforced.

Killed by Lightning. MOUNT PLEASANT, Tenn., July 12. Nine colored persons took refuge from a storm under a tree and were instantly killed by lightning. They had been to a funeral. The victims fell in a heap and seemed to die without a struggle.

A Question Settled. QUEBEC, July 12. The Provincial Government have received from the Ontario Government the sum of \$10,000 on account of the amount owed to this Province. The balance will be submitted to arbitration and this long-pending question will, it is said, soon be finally settled.
