Provincial Exhibition News Notes

When the evening show starts at 7:30 tonight with pony classes in the horse arena in front of the Grand Stand, a tall military figure in uniform will be noticed judging the classes. It is Lt.-Colonel R. S. Timmis, D. S. O., of Toronto, whose appointment has been favorably commented upon as an arbiter of awards for the Light Horse classes and Riding Club classes this year. A prominent Torontoonian has written the following regarding Colonel Timmis to Mr. J. W. Boulter, Secretary of the Exhibition.

"Dear Mr. Boulter:—I am delighted to hear that Lt.-Col. R. S. Timmis, D. S. O. (known to all his friends as Timmy) is going down to judge your show. You will find him an excellent judge and he knows and is known by most of the Light Horse officers.

"He is far too modest to tell you anything about himself so I thought I would drop you a line about him. He is a former commanding officer of the Royal Canadian Dragoons; he took a special course at the British Army Equestrian School at Wexford; he was a pupil of Professor Alfred Savignier in London; he is the author of several books on horses known throughout the British Army ("Modern Horse Management," "Riding and Schooling" etc.); he has given a lifetime to the study of horses and to instructing in riding and care of horses; he is a frequent contributor to "The Horse" (London, England) and to "Riding"; he is the District Commissioner (i. e. the instructor and examiner) for our branch of the Pony Club; he has frequently been on the Canadian Army Horse Show team including the one which went last year to Dublin and Germany and is likely to be the captain of this year's team; he had a distinguished war record and in particular commanded and led the squadron which formed the advance guard when the Canadian Cavalry Brigade went in mounted in front of Amiens in 1918 when Flowerdew won the V. C. Since leaving the army a couple of years ago he farms about twenty miles north of Toronto.

"You will see from the above that he is a most interesting man and I am quite sure that he will be quite prepared to give the members of your Riding Club some interesting talks when he is at Charlottetown.

"The prize list is held up at the printers for a few days but should be ready shortly and I will see that a copy is sent you. I enjoyed meeting you in the summer and also Dr. Seaman; please remember me to him. With very best wishes for a successful show."

INJURED IN FALL—A regrettable accident occurred yesterday morning when Mr. Ronald McDonald, line foreman for the Canadian National Telephone, fell from the roof of his residence, sustaining injuries which necessitated his removal to the Charlottetown Hospital.

Mr. McDonald was doing some repairs on the roof of his home when in some unaccountable manner he fell, a distance of some thirty feet. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and called, who had him removed by ambulance to the Hospital. An examination showed his left leg bruised above and below the knee, but apparently he was not suffering from any serious injuries or fractures about the head or face.

Returns From Extended Stay In Old Country

Belief that the present crisis in Europe will pass without war was expressed to a Guardian representative yesterday by Dr. John E. Andrew, son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Andrew, East Royalty, who has returned from an extended stay in the Old Country. Graduating from Dalhousie University in 1934, Dr. Andrew spent two years on the staff of the Ottawa City Hospital. He went to England in the autumn of 1936 and did post-graduate work at the London Hospital. He then took over the post of resident surgeon officer at the Kent and Sussex Hospital at Tunbridge Wells, where he qualified for the post of radiology registrar and was placed in charge of the radium clinic for cancer treatment in the surrounding areas of Kent and Sussex.

In May, 1938, Dr. Andrew went to the staff of the Royal Infirmary and Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh, and in October obtained the major surgical degree of Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.

Later he returned to Tunbridge Wells to carry out in surgery and to direct the radium clinic for cancer treatment.

While overseas Dr. Andrew travelled extensively in Europe. Shortly before sailing for home he visited France, Switzerland and Italy.

Horse Show Promises To Be Highlight

The forthcoming Horse Show which will get underway this evening promises to be the best ever held on Prince Edward Island. The quality of the horses has been improving each year and there will be few finer aggregations of saddle and light harness horses in any part of Canada than will be seen in Charlottetown this week.

Competition in the Maritimes Bred Saddle Class will be particularly keen and there is much speculation concerning the outcome, particularly in view of the fact that there are a number of very fine half-thoroughbreds some of them four years old, and some of them three years old, most of which have been training seriously for the past several months.

Colome G. Elliot Pull's "Silver King" has been undergoing training by Billy Porter for the past several months and he should go through his paces perfectly in the Maritime Bred Class. Apart from being a very able performer in the show ring this horse shows great promise as a jumper and as a hunter. He was sired by St. Sylvester is dapple gray in color, high headed and has excellent conformation. He placed third in this class last year but had very little training at that time.

Silver C. a fine four year old hunter type, sired by St. Sylvester and owned by Dr. F. Seaman is in perfect condition and has improved considerably since he took second place in last year's Maritime Bred Class. Unfortunately owing to the serious accident which happened to Fred Seaman last Saturday it is not known definitely whether Silver C. will be in the class this year. He has a chance of taking the ribbon if he enters the ring. He is the biggest and the best developed of any of the hunter type of horse produced in Prince Edward Island during recent years.

Gordon MacDonald's three year old Sylvester mare will be a new entry in this class this year. She has been undergoing training in Vimy Jones stables during the summer and will be ridden by Miss O'Byrne of Halifax, who is coming over to show her in the various classes.

Colonel Fred I. Andrew's Dorothy A. is another promising Sylvester three year old. She has been working out at the stables of the Charlottetown Riding Club for the past fortnight under Billy Porter and despite her short period of training she is likely to give a good account of herself. She has considerable speed in harness and will likely show in the Roadster Class as well as the Maritime Bred Saddle Class.

Earl Baker's Playboy is a full brother of Dorothy A. having been raised by Colonel Andrew and sold to Mr. Andrew last year. He has splendid action and spirit and good conformation.

Vimy Jones Lady B purchased from the Wetmore Stables of St. John last year was in the ribbons in a number of events at the Maritime Winter Fair and will likely be a serious contender for honours in this class.

Last but not least among contenders for the Maritime Bred Saddle Class is "Ace of Diamonds" owned by C. N. Bissett. This horse started his career by winning the Novice Class at last year's Charlottetown Horse Show, and followed this event by placing first in the Maritime Bred Saddle, first in the Ladies Saddle, second in the Roadster to Harness Class, and was in the money in every other class which he showed both here and at the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst where he won the Maritime Bred Saddle and also was declared Champion Carriage Horse of the Show.
