JOSEPH CAMPBELL

The citizens of Point de Roche and adjoining communities were saddened on August 22 when they learned of the sudden passing of a well known friend and neighbor, Mr. Joseph Campbell.

Mr. Campbell was stricken with a heart attack while he stopped to speak to his son while enroute by car to Mount Stewart. Mr

Campbell was rushed to St. Andrews where he received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church of which he was a staunch and devoted member.

The late Mr. Campbell was born at Miscouche 59 years ago, a son of the late Dougal Campbell and Annie Gillis. He received his early education in that community and when still a young man moved to Point de Roche. In this the community of his choice he prospered and established a reputation for honesty, hospitality and the other worthwhile assets of life. Later he married Margaret MacKinnon of Point de Roche to which union was born two children, Charles, now residing in Savage Harbour, and Margaret (Mrs. John Morrison) also of Savage Harbour.

His funeral which was held to St. Andrew's Church on August 24 was very largely attended, giving silent but eloquent testimony to the esteem in which friends and neighbors held this fine gentleman.

Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Father George MacCormick. Burial was in the church cemetery. Pallbearers were Messrs. Ralph Pigot, Wilfred Coffin, John D. McInnis, Peter Doyle, George MacCormack and Cyril Morrison. Funeral was under the direction of the Charlottetown Funeral Home.

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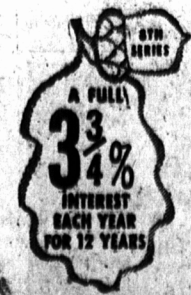
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
